Nodding Off to Sleep.

The loss of voluntary power in a person
sinking quietly into sleep is very gradual.
An object is grasped by the hand while yet
awake; it is seen to be held less and less
firmly as sleep comes on, till at last all
power is gone and it falls away. The head
of a person in a sitting posture gradually
loses the support of the muscles which sus-
tain it upright; it droops by degrees and
in the end falls upon the chest. The head
falls by the withdrawal of power from par-
ticular muscles, the slight shock thence en-
suing partially awakens and restores this
power, which again raises the head, and
this falling and raising, or, in other words,
the nodding, continues as long as the dozing
off to sleep while in a sitting posture con-
tinues. At the precise moment when the
mind loses its consciousness there results a
general relaxation of all the muscles. If
the body be at rest in a lying posture there
is no marked result, but, if the body be in
an uneasy posture, such as sitting, then the
relaxation of the muscles causes the falling
of the head and nodding described.—Brook-
