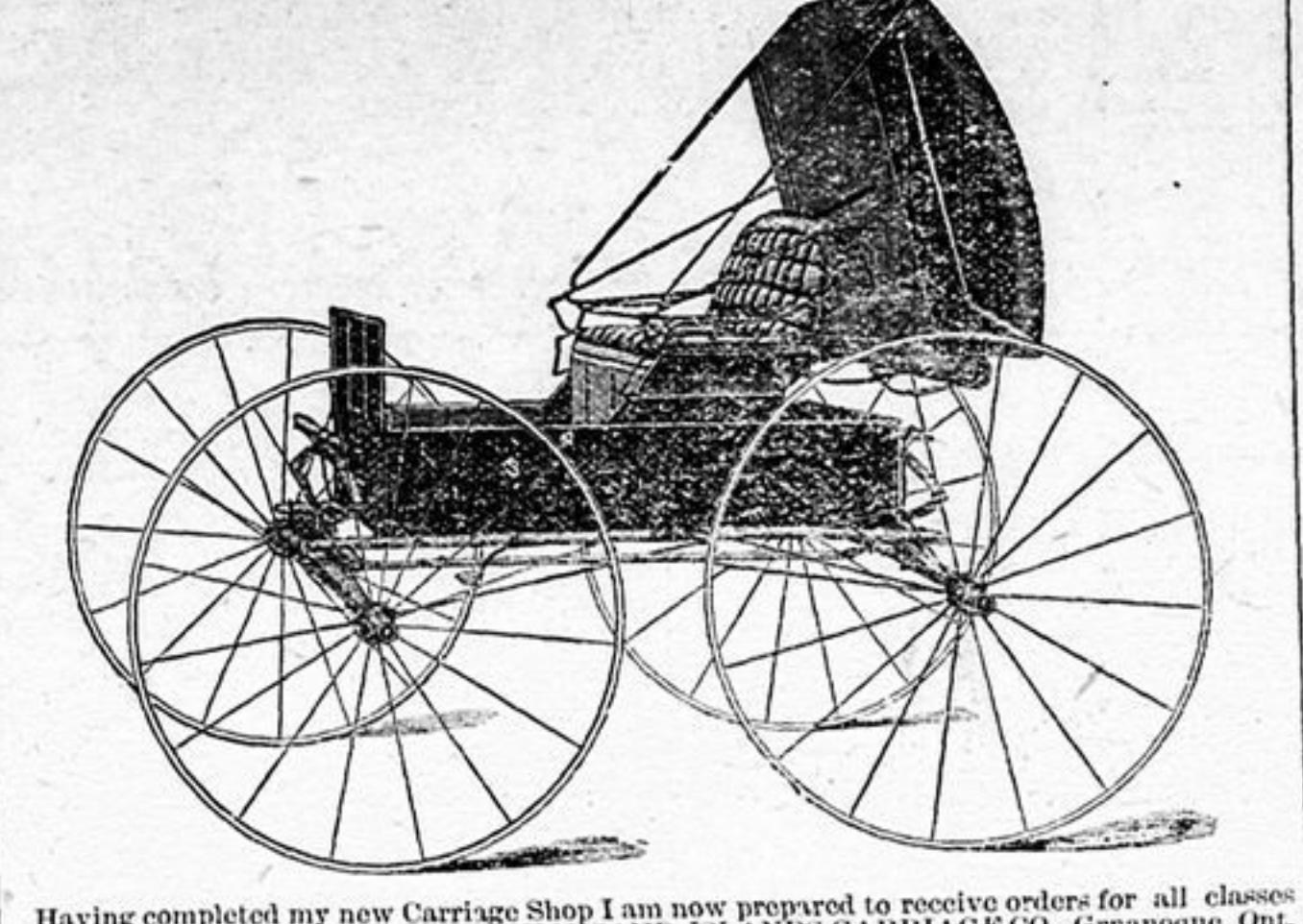

**NOTICE TO OWNERS AND HARBOURERS OF DOGS.**

**EXTRACT FROM BY-LAW NO. 200, OF THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE VILLAGE OF MILLBROOK, PASSED APRIL 1ST, 1895.**

That it shall be the duty of the owner of every dog or bitch in the Corporation to procure from the Clerk of the Municipality before the first of June in each year a tag for which he shall pay to the Clerk one dollar for each dog and two dollars for each bitch owned or harboured by him or her.

That any person found guilty of an infraction of this By-Law shall be liable to a penalty of not more than \$5.00 or not less than \$1.00 and costs.
