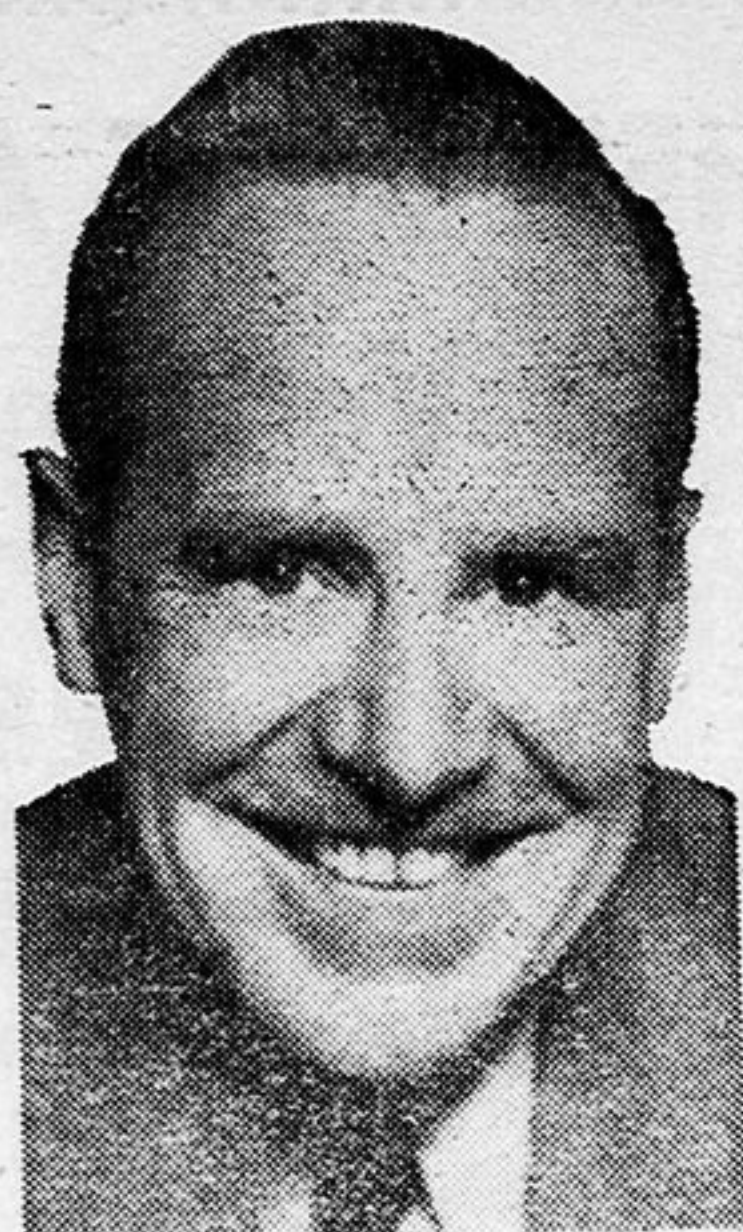

MORE ELDERLY PERSONS CARRIERS OF TB-PHILLIPS

A warning that there are an increasing number of elderly persons in Ontario who are "carriers" of tuberculosis was sounded recently in a radio talk by Dr. Mackinnon Phillips, minister of health.

"Fortunately, we found tuberculosis among the population who were between 20 and 45 years of age," he said. "This has now changed. We are now seeing more cases among teenagers and persons over 50 years of age."

"With the aid of x-ray programmes on admission to hospitals, mass surveys, and chest x-rays for school teachers, school children and employed persons, we are discovering many cases in the early stages, and are able to effect cures," he said.

"But the more elderly people, particularly those with any type of chest condition, are reluctant to present themselves for x-ray," said Dr. Phillips.

Call It Bronchitis

"Many of them choose to continue to describe their affliction as 'chronic bronchitis,'" he said, "and they do not intend to take a chance on finding out that it is something else. These people actually are carriers."

Even though tuberculosis has been reduced to fewer than five deaths per 100,000 population in Ontario, greater effort must be made to reach those not covered by x-ray programmes, said Dr. Phillips.—Toronto Daily Star.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Village By-Law No. 817 requires that any person who owns or harbours a dog in the Village of Millbrook shall on or before the First day of April in each year, obtain a License and Tag for such dog and shall keep such tag firmly attached to such dog during the year. Section 10 states that "Dog" shall mean any dog, male or female, and any age.

All dog owners who fail to purchase the necessary 1957 Dog License and Tag, are liable for prosecution under this By-Law.
