Textile Conference First of Kind Ever Held

Delegates from all over Canada will gather in Montreal on May 6-7-8 for an event unique in world textile history. With "a place for all", the Canadian Textile Conference will be the first gathering of its type ever held.

It is expected that more than 800 men and women representatives of the vast Canadian primary textile industry will register for the business sessions, and that some 5,000 people will see the mammoth fashion shows scattered throughout the three days.

More than a year in the planning, the Conference will cover almost every phase of textile industry business with more than 30 speakers, many of national and international fame. Two separate programs have been arranged to provide the ladies with alternate events during the more technical business sessions.

The Conference is organized entirely by the primary textile industry and its member groups and is designed to attract technicians, designers, marketing experts, economists, accountants, management, etc. At the same time the program includes a place for chemical suppliers, garment manufacturers, retailers and consumers.

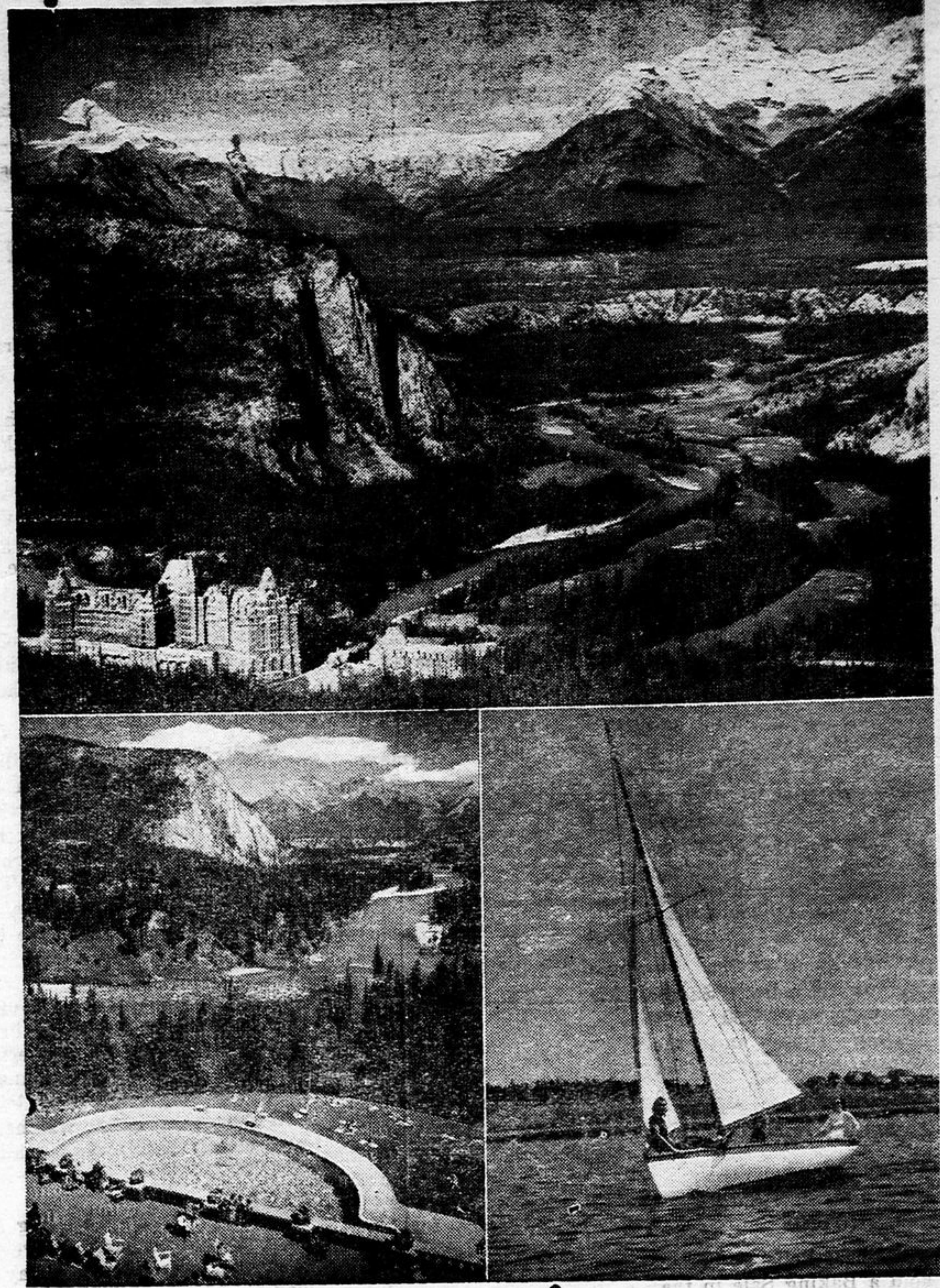
Fist industrial conference in Montreal's new Queen Elizabeth, this gathering has already attracted advance registration from such widely separated places as British Columbia and New Brunswick. Many "textile towns" in Ontario and Quebec are staging special events, such as mill visit and displays of textile products, during Conference week under the general slogan of "Canadian Textiles for Canadians." Hundreds of display cards bearing this inscription and the Conference motif will be exhibited.

To discuss the textile industry's place in the Canadian economy, speakers at the actual Conference will include: Hon. Jean-Paul Beaulieu, Quebec's Minister of Trade and Commerce; Margaret Aitken, federal M.P. for York-Humber; Harold V. Lush, President of the Canadian Manufacturers Association; C. F. Fraser, nationally known consulting economist; and H. Roy Crabtree, President of the Primary Textiles Institute.

Under the general heading of Technology, Industrial Relations and Marketing there will be three separate series of talks by such authorities as: Prof. F. E. Folts, Harvard Graduate School of Business; J. B. Goldberg, noted textile technical consultant; P. M. Jones, New York Carpet Institute; Harold Clawson, a leading Canadian expert on industrial relations; Dr. Earl G. Planty, of the University of Illinois; Dean F. W. P. Jones University of Western Ontario School of Business Administration.

A panel discussion on "Easy Care Fabrics" will bring together 11 representatives of industry, retailing and consumers, with Mary Humphries, Charman of the Textile Committee of the Canadian Association of Consumers, among them. Mrs. B. A. Plumtre, an economist with the Tariff Board and Vice-president of the CAC, will participate in a panel discussion on the economic future of the industry.

To demonstrate the high quality of industry fabrics, of cotton, wool and man-made fibres, there will be three showings, in all or part, of a collection of 80 women's, men's and children's garments. The work of leading Canadian manufacturers and members of the Association of Canadian Couturi-

HOTELS PREPARE FOR SUMMER

ers these gowns will be displayed in dramatic style with specially written music.

The ladies will join the main program for receptions and dinners, but during the remainder of the three days their program offers a tour of the St. Lawrence Seaway operations, a fur fashion show, a discussion of figure problem, a demonstration by members of the Montreal Potter's Club, a conducted tour of the new hotel, and shopping expeditions.

F. D. Wallace, a leading textile educationist and Chairman of the Conference Executive Committee, has described the gathering as "a demonstration of the strength and vitality of the industry and is of value to the Canadian economy."

He noted that the Conference was the first of its kind in world textile history. "All industries, including the Canadian, have regular gatherings of such groups as technicians, management, marketing, etc., but never before has there been an event where all segments of a textile industry were gathered under one roof at one time."

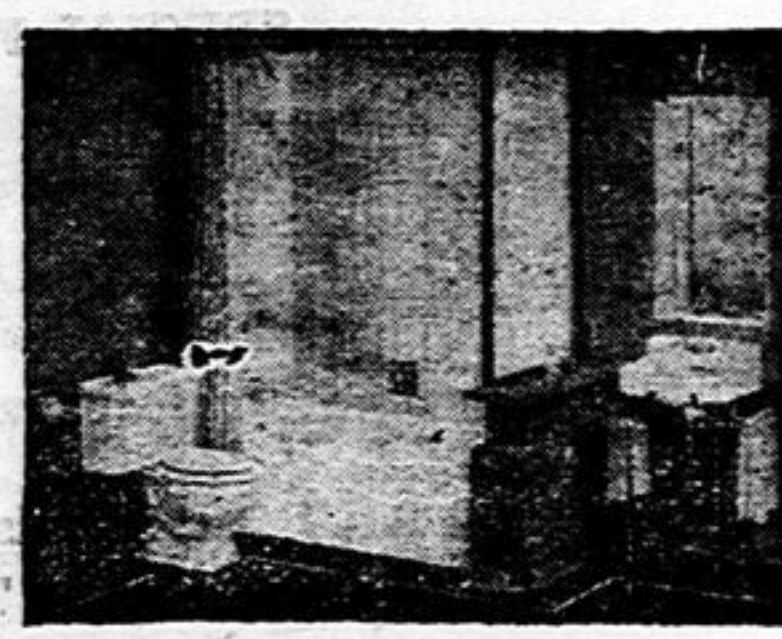
