PRIZES TOTTALLING \$50,000. TO BE COMPETED FOR CHANCE FOR STUDENTS

More than 300 projects are expected to be entered by Ontario vocational and industrial arts students in the fourth annual Ontario Students Craftsman's Fair sponsored by Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, under the direction of a committee chaired by Harvey Fenton, Pickering District High School.

The Fair is to be presented at Eaton's College Street in Toronto, May 26 to 30 inclusive, and entries will be judged by a group of experts under the chairmanship of B. A. Mennie, Stratford Teachers College.

Select winners from the Ontario Fair will be sent on to Dearborn, Michigan for competition in the International Industrial Arts Awards sponsored by Ford Motor Company.

More than 5,000 outstanding student projects selected in local contests from all over the United States and Canada will be in the International competition.

Members of the committee in charge of the Ontario Fair are: Mr. Fenton, chairman; Harold Skinner, Bathurst Heights Collegiate and Vocational Institute, immediate past chairman; Cecil Jensen, Oshawa; Robt. Fudger, Kingston; Ellis Miller, Owen Sound; Russell Haines, Essex District High School; V. Byrnes, Brantford; Hendley Burden, Chatham; B. A. Mennie, Stratford Teachers College; and Jack Spry, Ont. College of Education, Toronto, who is Canadian advisor to the Industrial Arts Awards.

Fourteen divisions, divided into 30 classifications are provided for the competing students who will be judged on the basis of grade level. The divisions cover students from Grade 7 to Grade 12.

Select winners in the Ontario Fair will receive Certificates of Merit and silver lapel pins and their projects will be entered in the International Fair, where they will compete for prizes totalling \$50,000. Of the winners, 32 projects will be given Outstanding Achievement Awards and the students and their instructors will receive expense-free trips to Dearborn in the fall when they will be guests of Ford Motor Company for three days.

Divisions open to competition are: mechanical drawing, wood working, electrical, graphic arts, leather, ceramics, jewelry, models, wrought metal, pattern making and moulding, plastics, machine shop, architectural drawing.

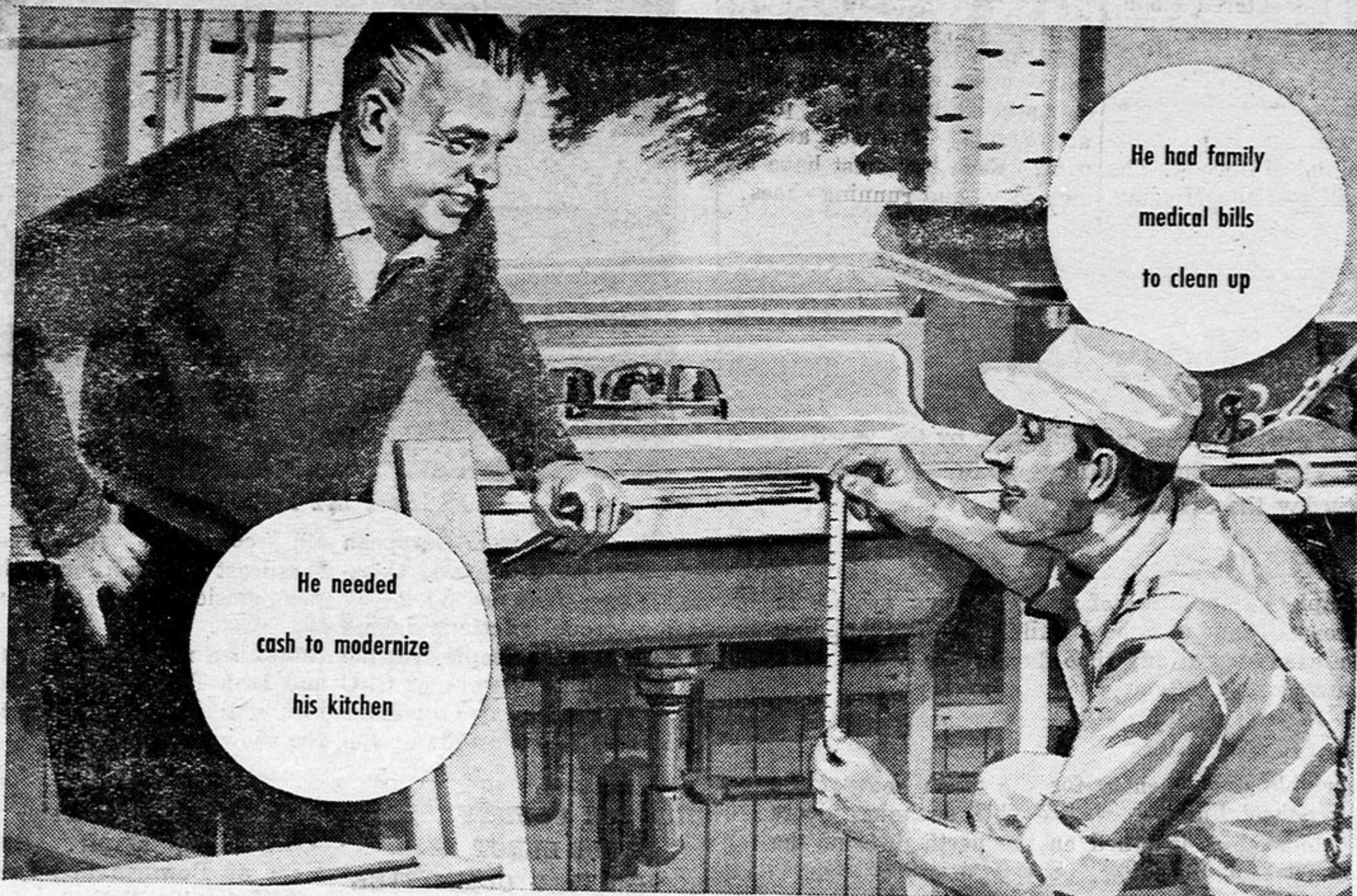
