Sunday Morning At St. Andrew's

Sunday, May 4th, was a red letter day at St. Andrew's for us, as we were honoured by having as our guest speaker, the Rev. Floyd Honey, Secretary of the Board of Overseas Missions of the United Church of Canada, and for several years a missionary in China.

Coming directly from the recent annual meeting of the Board of Overseas Missions, he pictured vividly the latest developments of that work, including the appointment of 11 new missionaries for overseas—five couples and one single person. Two ministers for evangelistic work in Trinidad and Korea, one teacher of theology, to the Canadian Academy in Japan; one leader skilled in agriculture; one civil engineer, one to public health work in Angola, Africa.

The situation in which they will be working is very different from that of a generation ago, when we pictured a missionary as a Western man in the centre of a gathering of natives, telling the story of Jesus and His love to the heathens. Now we realize that there are heathen folk everywhere, not just in the non-Christian world, but also in Europe, North America, and Canada.

Scripture reading—Ephesians 3:1-9.

These new missionaries will work within a church already established, and as workers within a local church board, established and planted, growing its own mature leadership, the missionary not the centre of the picture, but working with native colleagues, in a much desired advisory capacity as part of a world-wide Fellowship, which pays allegiance to Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and in many cases is branching out into pioneering in mission work in new areas, on its own!

Recently, as an example, two native Japanese missionaries have been appointed to help with work in Canada, in cities like Hamilton, and two Christian Japanese families have migrated to British Columbia, where they will strengthen the work in the local church community where they settle.

The whole message was one of World-Wide Vision, and most inspiring.

The senior choir sang for us "Rejoice the Lord is King!" and the juniors the second verse of hymn 251. The congregation got their innings in the recessional hymn, "Jesus shall reign where'er the sun, Doth his successive journeys run, No. 294.
