

### Durham County Federation of Agriculture

Durham County Federation of Agriculture held their regular monthly Directors Meeting in the Orono Township Hall on Wednesday evening, April 30. Helping in the arrangement of this meeting the County Insurance Committee planned a talk and pictures to be put on by Mr. Ray Hergott, Field Supervisor of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture. Important business matters dealt with at this meeting were as follows:—

among all poultry producers who maintain a flock of 100 or more hens. A levy was being asked of 2 cents per 30 dozen case of eggs and 1 cent per hen, to bear the cost of organization and a Promotional Plan for eggs and fowl. Ron had also been appointed Zone Director for this district.

The Secretary reported he had attended a meeting of the Land Acquisition Committee, which had dealt chiefly with agreements, compensations and damage settlements between Farmers and Hydro. Mr. Harris, Q.C., had attended this meeting and given legal advice. A draft of these proposed recommendations would in the near future be discussed with Hydro.

A letter was read from Oxford County Federation of Agriculture asking for endorsement of a resolution to the Federal Department of Agriculture asking that the compensation paid for T.B. and Brucellosis re-actors be increased from the present \$40.00 for grade and \$100.00 for pure-bred cattle to \$80.00 for grade and \$150.00 for pure-bred. The resolution was passed on motion by Dalton Dorrell and Albert Arnold.

It was announced by the E. A. Summers Memorial Committee that the Memorial Fund had now reached approximately \$1,100.00, with still more sources to be heard from. A

Trophy has been ordered to be presented at the Royal Winter Fair as a perpetual Memorial to the late Mr. Summers to the boy obtaining the highest score in the inter-county competition. The manner of applying the remainder of the Fund has as yet not been decided by the Committee.

Mr. Ted Burnside, assistant Agriculture Representative for the summer months under Mr. Oliver Dalrymple, was introduced to the meeting and called on for a few remarks. He expressed his pleasure in being stationed in Durham County and hoped to become better acquainted as time went on.

Mr. Hergott was then called on and gave a very comprehensive talk on C.I.A. Insurance, dating his remarks to the formation of the Association, its needs, ideals and objectives. The Co-Operators Insurance Association had been formed to fill a real insurance need to Farmers at a cost they could afford to pay, he said. It had started with auto insurance and had gradually developed until now it covered almost every insurance need of the Farmer and also many others. He outlined the growth of the Association and told how in 1956 the loss ratio of all companies had been so high that almost all had lost money on auto insurance in that year. Due to this high loss ratio C.I.A. had found it necessary to raise its premiums in the latter part of 1956.

Many of the companies had not done so until 1957 and had then made two raises in that year. Because C.I.A. had raised its rates early it had suffered some cancellation of policies early in 1957. However, when other companies had made two raises compared with one raise for C.I.A. many restorations began pouring in the latter part of 1957. A comparative figure taken in the first three months of 1956-7-8 showed the trend—

Mr. Hergott was thanked for his very illuminating talk and pictures and after being served a very delicious lunch by the ladies, the meeting adjourned.
