4-H CLUB LEADERS MET IN BOWMANVILLE LAST THURSDAY

Durham County 4-H Agricultural Club Leaders met in Bowmanville on Thursday, 8th of May, to organize a 4-H club leaders association for Durham County. The leaders were guests of the Ontario Department of Agriculture at a luncheon followed by an organization meeting in the Department of Agriculture Board Room, Bowmanville.

A. O. Dalrymple, Agricultural representative outlined briefly the reasons for organizing a 4-H club leaders association and pointed out some of the things that had been carried out by this group in other counties in Ontario. Following some discussion it was decided to organize the association and the officers for 1958 are:

A bus trip committee was also picked to look into future trips and the committee was composed of the members of the executive.

In addition the coaching night will be held for all 4-H club members and junior farmers on the evening of Friday, May 23rd. This coaching night meeting will be compulsory for attendance will count for all Durham County 4-H club members. In the judging competition a few minor changes were made in that a novice class will be added to the competition for young men who have not previously taken part in a judging competition. Entries must be made previous to May 24th. to The Ontario Department of Agriculture, in Bowmanville with an entry fee of .50 cents.

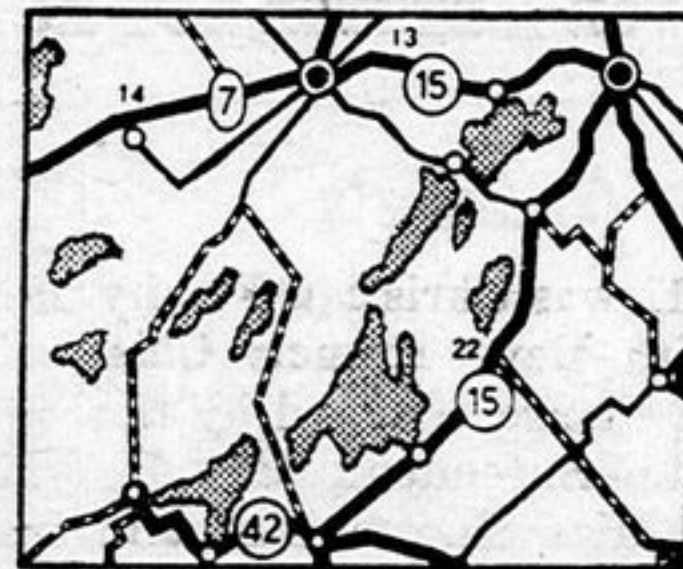
