

South Monaghan Township Passes School By-Law

The regular meeting of the Municipality of South Monaghan was held in the Township Hall on May 5, 1958, at 8 p.m. with all members present and Reeve Ray Bothwell presiding.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read by the Clerk and adopted on motion by Robertt Fisher seconded by George Dean.

The Building Inspector, Mr. George Fletcher was present and several small matters were discussed.

Mr. Orville Young interviewed the Council and presented a claim in the amount of \$62.40 for poultry killed and badly injured by stray dogs. The livestock valuer's report had been received by the Clerk and this was also presented.

The Road Superintendent Mr. M. H. Thompson presented road voucher No. 4 in the amount of \$998.88 and after careful scrutiny was passed for payment on motion by Robert Fisher seconded by Herb Syer.

Mr. Harry Larmer interviewed the Council in regards to Warble Fly spraying and after discussion it was decided to have him make another inspection of cattle in this regard.

The question of fire protection came up again for considerable discussion and Councillor Anderson moved that the Municipality engage Bewdley fire department, however this motion did not receive any support.

Council adjourned on motion by Robert Fisher seconded by G. Anderson to resume session

on May 6th, at 8.30 p.m. Council resumed session on May 6th. as scheduled, all members present.

The following correspondence had been received by the Clerk.—The Canadian National Railways requesting attendance of Clerk and Reeve at a meeting in Millbrook on May 15, this was accepted; Five new Hydro contracts approved; Northumberland Federation of Agriculture requesting a grant and on motion of Robt. Fisher seconded by George Dean a donation of \$50.00 was approved; J. L. Graham, Co. regarding issuance of debentures, this was ordered tabled; Dept. of Labour approving appointment of M. H. Thompson as inspector under the Trench Excavators Protection Act; Mountain Sanatorium, Hamilton advising of admittance of George Brook; these communications were ordered received and filed.

Jerry Stock, Arthur Beebe and Robt. Hazleton interviewed the Council in the interest of setting up a local volunteer fire fighting force. After due consideration a motion by Geo. Dean seconded by Herb Syer carried, that the Council or a representation of Councillors in company with representatives from the volunteers and representatives from the Peterborough fire department inspect and see test performed on used truck in Toronto on a date agreeable to all and if found satisfactory to arrange purchase.

On motion of G. Anderson seconded by Robt. Fisher the Clerk introduced and gave first reading to By-law No. 638 authorizing the Municipality to issue debentures in the amount of \$39,740. for the erection of a two rooms addition to Baillieboro Publis Schol.

Second reading was given on motion by Geo. Dean seconded by H. Syer. Third and final reading to be withheld until approval is granted by the Municipal Board.

On motion of Herb Syer

seconded by Robt. Fisher the Clerk introduced and gave first reading to By-law No. 639. This By-law to authorize the Clerk to make application to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval to issue debentures.

Second reading was given on motion by G. Anderson seconded by Geo. Dean. Third and final reading was given on motion by Herb Syer seconded by Geo. Dean, and accordingly this By-law passed.

On motion by Robt. Fisher seconded by H. Syer the Clerk introduced and gave first reading to By-law No. 640. This By-law to repeal By-law No. 598 and introduce new regulations in the construction of

new buildings or additions to existing buildings or moving buildings within the Township.

Second reading was given on motion by Geo. Dean seconded by G. Anderson. Third and final reading was given on motion by Robt. Fisher seconded by Herb Syer.

Gerald Anderson moved, seconded by Robt. Fisher, motion carried, that the Reeve contact the Fire Marshall's office and request a visit from a representative of that department at his convenience.

On motion by Geo. Dean, seconded by Robt. Fisher the meeting adjourned, to meet again at the call of the Reeve. J. E. Robinson, Clerk.
