

Sunday Morning At St. Andrew's

This was Whitsunday and Pentecost. Acts 2:1-4. "And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues as of fire, and it sat upon each of them, and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance, so that the multitudes from the area around the Mediterranean Sea were able to hear in their own tongue the Gospel message which Peter preached unto them, and the same day there were added unto them about 3,000 souls. As Bethlehem was honoured with the Birth of Saviour, Jesus Christ, so Jerusalem witnessed the birth-day of the Christian Church on this glorious day of Pentecost in fulfilment of the prophecy of the prophet Joel 400 B.C. WILDA HARKER OBTAINS HIGHEST STANDING AT QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY

Wilda Harker has recently been announced winner of three scholarships at the end of her third year in arts at Queen's University. Their total value is \$1,150. They are the Reuben Wells Leonard Scholarship for highest standing in arts at the end of the penultimate year; the Eliza Fitzgerald Scholarship for the woman student obtaining the highest standing at the end of the penultimate year; and a University Scholarship awarded to the student of each department obtaining the highest standing.

Miss Harker was also a scholarship winner her first two years at University. The first year she won the Sir Wilfred Laurier Scholarship in oral French and shared the Susan Near Scholarship for written French. The second year as well as a University Scholarship for highest standing, she won the Anne Adamson one in psychology.

Miss Harker is a graduate of Millbrook High School. She says she has never found it a disadvantage to have come from a small school. In fact, she thinks it might be an advantage. Good students learn to be independent working for themselves while the teacher conducts another class. They are also able to learn from other classes conducted in their hearing. If they do feel the need of individual instruction on any points she thinks perhaps it is easier to get it in a small school than in a large one.

Other schools Miss Harker attended included Central Public School, St. Mary's, and Mitchell High School, where most of her first year was spent. She moved with her family to Millbrook in April of 1939. She attended Peterborough Normal School on a Dominion-Provincial bursary. The schools in which she was taught before attending University were Cairo and Whitfield Schools in Cavan Township and Ontario Street school in Bowmanville.

Miss Harker is the daughter of the late Rev. Michael Henry (Harry) Harker and the former Emma J. Grenke, who still lives with her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. John Gillen, on the farm which the Harkers moved to after ill health caused him to give up the ministry.

When asked about her plans for the future, Miss Harker said that after graduation next

year she would like to go on for her master's degree in psychology if she is able to get a fellowship. After that she might do work in child psychology, perhaps of a clinical nature with emotionally disturbed children. During the summer last year she worked with Miss Isabel Laird, professor of child psychology, testing babies and young children.—Examiner.

HIGHWAY TRAFFIC ACT AMENDMENTS IN FORCE

Legislation came into effect on Monday, May 26th which introduces new controls and protection for drivers and pedestrians alike.

The dangerous pedestrian practice of crossing against red signal lights is now prohibited. Either while the red light of the combined green and amber lights are facing a pedestrian at a signal-controlled intersection, he "shall not enter the roadway until a green light is shown". Similarly, with "Wait, Walk" signals, he must not enter the roadway except when the "Walk" signal is facing him.

The controlling action of "Yield Right of Way" signs has been changed from prohibiting drivers entering a "Yield" intersection at a speed greater than 15 m.p.h., which in some circumstances was found to be excessive, to require motorists to slow down to a reasonable speed for existing conditions and to stop if necessary.

Enabling legislation to permit passing on the right in certain circumstances was enacted in 1957, but the need for close study before action was taken was recognized. Limited legislation, effective May 26th, allows passing on the right when (a) an overtaken vehicle is making or has signalled a left turn, (b) within a city, town or village on a street or highway of two or more lanes in
