

Millbrook Village Council

Millbrook, May 4th, 1959.—The monthly meeting of the Municipal Council of the Village of Millbrook was held on the above date. Members present as follows:—Reeve, G. F. Harrington; Councillors, Lavern Gibson, C. E. Thornton, Vincent Crough and Robert Ridge.

Minutes of the last regular meeting of April 6th, and special meeting with School Board on April 20th were read by the Clerk and on motion of Councillors Gibson and Thornton were received.

Mr. E. Paris was present and addressed the Council regarding the proposed new school area.

The following communications were read by the Clerk:—From Northumberland & Durham Health Unit, report for March. Dept. of Finance enclosing grant in the amount of \$1335.00 re the assessment on Armouries and Post Office. Mrs. Grace Gallie, re taxes on property on Frederick St., W. Mrs. Gwenith Crompton, application for nursing home license. Millbrook Public School Board proposing the centralization of Cavan South Township School Area and the village of Millbrook, including Union School Section No. 11. W. E. Rundle, Clerk, Darlington Township, asking approval of Council of the following resolution: "That the Township of Darlington petition the Counties Council to pass a By-law detaching the Township of Darlington from the Durham County High School District, and to authorize the attachment of the Township of Darlington to a new District comprising the Township of Darlington and the Township of Bowmanville."

R. B. Reynolds, Town Clerk, Bowmanville, asking the approval of Council of the following resolution: "That the Town of Bowmanville petition the County Council to pass a By-law detaching the Town of Bowmanville from the Durham County District High School Board and authorize the attachment of the Town of Bowmanville to a new district comprising the Municipalities of the Town of Bowmanville and the Township of Darlington. W. E. Reynolds, Secretary-Treasurer of the Durham County District High School Board stating that the Board has complete approval from four Municipalities, (Cavan, Millbrook, Hope and Clarke) and qualified approval from Port Hope, Newcastle and Darlington. The three have qualified their approval by asking that the Clarke site be decided by an independent body. In view of this development, the Municipality of Millbrook was asked if it would approve the issue of debentures for the Darlington and Millbrook Schools and the Clarke school when the site has been chosen. Moved by Councillor Crough and seconded by Councillor Thornton that the Village of Millbrook approve the Schools and for Clarke when the site is chosen and that the Durham County District High School Board be notified of this approval. From Fire Chief Douglas Sheppard reporting on a tendancy of firemen at fire practice, six members present. Equipment reported in good order. Motion by Councillor Crough and Ridge that communications not otherwise dealt with be received and filed. Motion by Councillors Gibson and Thornton that the Reeve and Clerk be instructed to amend Section (a) of Section 1. By-law No. 854 to read "Board means Board of Health" and not as previously written. Council stated that bills not brought in for regular meeting are to be held over until next regular meeting.

A report was received from Councillor Thornton regarding the Town Truck. Mr. Thornton has been instructed to consult the Foreman and Engineer of the Counties re a new truck for the town. His expenses to be paid. A special meeting to be called when this information is received by Mr. Thornton.

Councillor L. Gibson, Chairman of the Fire Committee, was authorized to purchase fire equipment needed by the Brigade, immediately.

Motion by Councillors Thornton and Ridge the following mill rates were set for the year 1959:

- County rate 11.7 mills.
- Village rate 26.4 mills (commercial)
- Village rate 21.5 mills (residential)
- School Debentures, United Counties No. 1, 2.3 mills; No. 2, .57 mills; Bowmanville .26 mills; Millbrook 1.06 mills, Arena .57 mills.
- School Maintenance—Millbrook Public S. .15 mills; Millbrook High S. 9.2 mills.
- Total—Commercial 67.1 mills
- Total—Residential 62.2 mills.

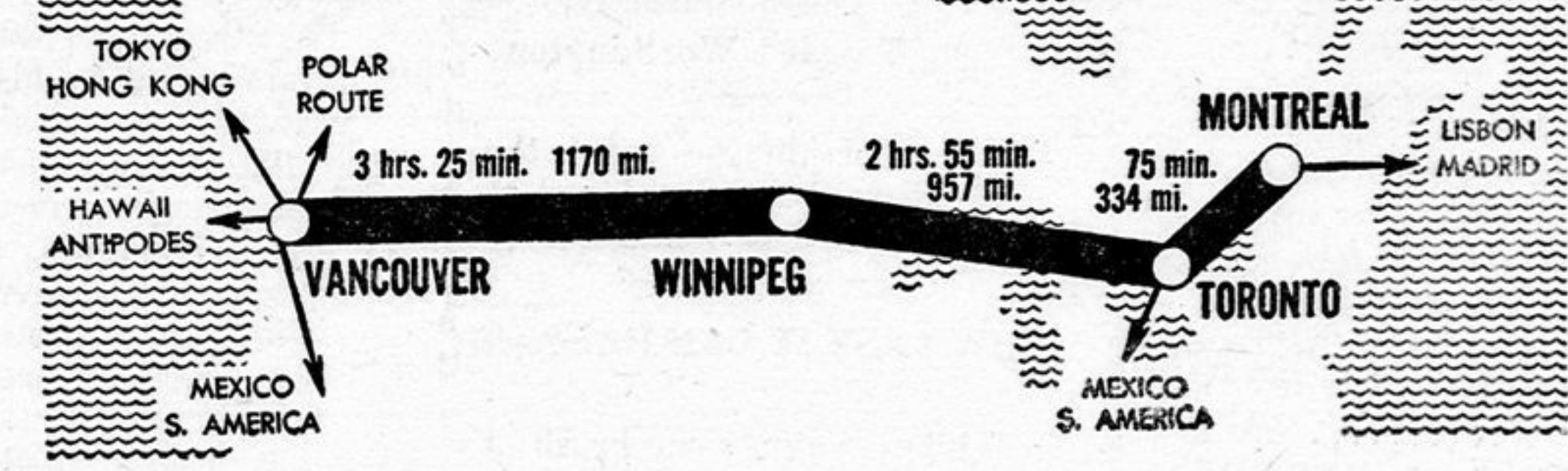
Sunday Morning At St. Andrew's

One of Canadian Pacific Airlines new 400 m.p.h. Britannia aircraft streaks across the above layout as it did through the skies of Canada on May 4 when CPA's new daily cross-Canada service linked Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver. Cutting one hour, 25 minutes from existing commercial airlines flying time between Vancouver and Montreal, CPA will become the first Canadian airline to provide tourist accommodation in a jet-prop plane.

Upper left, Capt. Jim McGuire explains to passenger the "Eye in the Sky" radar unit installed to detect weather disturbances ahead of the airliner so that the rough air may be avoided. Upper right, stewards and stewardesses from Germany, China, Holland, France and Japan who operate on CPA's international routes fanning out from each end of the new cross-Canada service. Lower left, meals on tables and continental cuisine will be features of both

tourist and first class service. Lower right, pilots learn how to fly the Britannia in a flight simulator, exact replica of the plane's flight deck. The operator, seated behind pilots, flicks switches to create every type of in-flight situation which a pilot might encounter. At bottom, route map indicates mileages and eastbound flying times between cities to be served by CPA, and also shows international connections at each end of new route.

He leaves to cherish his memory his wife, the former Margaret Jane McCutcheon, and two sons, James and Robert (Bob) both of Millbrook. Eight grandchildren and one great grandchild also survive, besides a sister Mrs. Harry Seaton (Zilla) in her 90's, of Peterborough, and a brother I. W. Larmer of Cavan Township.

A daughter Martha Helen and a son Loftus Charles, predeceased him.

Four years ago Mr. and Mrs. Larmer celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Mr. Larmer attended St. Andrew's United Church.

The deceased farmed in Saskatchewan from 1893 to 1919 and also operated a hardware store. He returned to Millbrook and ran Silver Creek farm near the village, after which he operated a grain elevator at Frazerville for John Douglas, and later a feed mill by the Dewar Milling Co.

The funeral took place from 10 to 11 a.m. at the funeral home, King Street East, Millbrook, on Monday, May 11, at 2 o'clock.

Burial was in the Millbrook Cemetery.

Survivors include Mrs. M. Neal and The

Rev. J. Edgar M. Palfrey of Millbrook officiating. The pallbearers were: Reginald Fallis, Allan Earle, Marshall Larmer, Lawrence Larmer, Reginald Atchison and John Lewis. Interment was in St. Paul's Cemetery, Cavan Township.
