cession of Manvers; Dept. of Planning and Development re the Otonabee River Conserva- tion project meeting on May 26th, 1959, at 2 p.m.; Division Court, Oshawa re cheque on delinquent account; Victoria County Clerk, re the matter of Mr. Fair's services re High School Appeal and fees for the members of the committees; and several accounts.

Canterbury Choir At St. Thomas' Church

In St. Thomas' Church on Sunday evening May 10, Fetal Evensong was sung by the Canterbury Choir of All Saints' Church, Peterborough, under the direction of Mrs. C. Wat- son, with Mr. Paul Walker at the organ. The choir unable to be present in full strength added great beauty and inspira- tion to the Service. Devotion- al works by H. G. Ley, Rowley, Willan, Boyce, Mendelssohn and Mozart were offered.

The Introit, Proper Psalms and Hymns concentrated on the Ascension of our Lord, which was commemorated last Thurs- day. This gave special signifi- cance to the Magnificat and the Nunc Dimittis—setting by Ley—and the singing of the Creed. Following the collects Rowley's Anthem "Praise" suddenly filled the Chancel, drawing us all up with it to join in heart and mind in the one triumphant theme "Praise- Praise to Him." Then came the deeply appealing "If YE Love Me" in which the voices moving about, almost make question an answer question and command, question and promise. "The King Ascend- eth into Heaven" rang out a- gain and again in the "Praise" of Him who is THE KING as He took His rightful place above the eyes of sinful men, in glory and majesty.

The rector's sermon opened with the words "Christ is King" and explained the mean- ing of Ascension as the "Coronation and Enthronement of Christ the King at the right hand of the Father". Then he read the Scriptural authority for this event from the 16th chapter of St. Mark, also the more detailed account from the 1st chapter of Acts.

The text was taken from verses 26 and 27 of the 15th chapter of St. John's Gospel, which words were spoken to the Disciples some time before the tragic events of the Cross but were not fully appreciated until after the glorious Resur- rection and triumphant Ascen- sion. They are not merely in- structions for the Apostles but are for the comfort and guid- ance of the Church in all ages.

He went on to explain how we were to tell others of Christ by our words, by our actions and by our very lives, we are not merely relying on past facts of history, but the fact itself to which we witness is in us and with us. Christ, the everlast- ing Christ is speaking in us and through us and is with us "even unto the end."

Nothing prevents the ac- complishment of HIS great work of redeeming the whole of humanity and transforming society, but our own half-heart- ed faith in the reality of HIS presence. It is not Christ who fails; Christianity does not fail; it is the Christians who fail. Let us go out determined to bear our witness of Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour. Let us believe that Christ the King is holding us up by HIS Mighty Power, giving us the words to speak, helping us to live the life that will break down the strongholds of the enemy Satan, and meet the contempt of the world that does not know God and comfort the sinner and the mourner, strengthen the sick the age and the infirm, an encourage the honest the true and the clean. In that we shall the Lord Jesus Christ be made known in the earth.
