WELCOME NEWS TO THOSE IN NEED OF LOANS

Entry into the consumer finance field through expansion of its personal instalment loan activity has been announced by The Toronto-Dominion Bank. In making the announcement, President A. C. Ashforth stated: "The Bank is prepared to make loans to individuals of satisfactory credit standing for almost any worthwhile purpose."

He defined this to include the acquisition of household appliances, new home furnishings and automobiles. "That list is by no means complete", he added, "Loans can be secured for the payment of accumulated medical expense, payment of taxes, to finance university tuition fees and even to finance a vacation. When we say worthwhile we mean just that."

"The Bank's participation in the consumer finance field will be confined to direct loans to individuals. Trade paper of appliance and automobile dealers will not be purchased. "Loans are to be repaid by monthly instalments and the period of repayment will vary, depending on the purpose of the loan and the ability of the borrower to repay, the maximum period being 30 months. "Life insurance protection for the borrower, for the amount of the unpaid balance of the loan, will be provided in every case."

"Many people have the idea that The Bank will only make personal loans on the security of bonds and stocks. Most loans under the new plan will be secured by a chattel mortgage or lien on the item being financed. Where the borrower is well known to The Bank and his ability to repay undoubted the loan may be unsecured. Only in exceptional cases will an endorser be required."

"The cost of a Toronto-Dominion personal loan will be relatively low. Mr. Ashforth stated, and will consist of simple interest at the rate of six per cent on the outstanding balance, plus a service charge which will cover the cost to The Bank of operating an instalment loan plan, obtaining and registering a chattel mortgage and insurance on the life of the borrower during the period of the loan. The total cost to the borrower will be considerably lower than one usually finds in the consumer finance field."

In referring to the new plan as an expansion of The Bank's personal loan activity, Mr. Ashforth made it clear that The Bank has always made personal loans. "Now, however

we propose to broaden our field of service and to make loans for purposes for which we did not previously entertain applications for loans. Furthermore, in considering loans under the new plans the main emphasis will be on the character of the borrower and his or her ability to repay, rather than the security offered. "There is little question that our economy is no longer based on what people need so much as on what they want. Instalment financing is an accepted part of our way of life and we feel that in providing the service to people of good credit standing we are only meeting our responsibility to the Canadian public."

COMPETING IMPORTS THREATEN JOBS OF CANADIANS

"To buy foreign-made manufactured articles when a Canadian equivalent is available is to endanger the whole structure of Canada's manufacturing industries," The Steel Company of Canada, Limited, told its shareholders today in a message incorporated in quarterly dividend notices.

The Steelco message pointed out that Canada's manufacturing industries now provide the greatest amount of employment in Canada and make the largest contributions to government revenues. This being the case, the importation of goods to compete with Canadian-made products is virtually the importation of unemployment. Steelco said that it would not be realistic to believe that Canada could live and trade entirely within her own borders and acknowledged that some products must be bought from off-shore.

However, the message continued, "The dollar we spend in Canada stays in Canada to be circulated from hand to hand, keeping the wheels of industry turning, and enabling each of us to look forward to a continuing demand for Canadian products and services, a continuing income, and a continuing control over the resources and future of our country."
