

Cavan Township Council

Millbrook, May 6th, 1959.—Cavan Council met on above date in regular session at 1.00 p.m. in the Council Chamber, all members present, Reeve L. A. Hooton in the Chair.

Minutes of last regular meeting read, on motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Burns that minutes be adopted as read. Carried.

On motion of Councillors Burns-Farrow that Mr. Traynor be paid for road through farm for year of 1958, and the Clerk to notify Mr. Traynor that same would be discontinued, and he would receive no more pay for same. Carried.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn-Councillor Stewart the Clerk was to notify the purchasing department of the Department of Highways that there was arrears of taxes registered against the property of Pt. Lot 23, Con. 14, and ask for payment to be made for land sold to be made at this office to apply on taxes. Carried.

Mrs. Brayley addressed the Council re taxes on Pt. Lot 13, Con. 14, as same had the building listed, and building was removed in 1957. The Reeve told Mrs. Brayley that the tax roll was compiled in 1957 for 1958 taxes, and same could have been taken off if she had appealed it at Court of Revision in 1957, but now she would have to pay the taxes, and then Council could give her a refund re same.

The Millbrook Public School Board requesting the two Councils of Millbrook and Cavan to pass By-laws to unite the South Area of Cavan Public Schools and the S.S. No. 11 Millbrook into one area. Welfare Officers Association, re Convention June 15-16 at the Sault Ste. Marie, and urging that representative be sent. Canadian Mental Health Association, soliciting donation. Canadian Cancer Society, soliciting donation. Dept. of Public Welfare, re legislation. Dept. of Municipal Affairs, re requirements re grants to be printed on tax bills. Dept. of Agriculture, re compensation re rabie losses. Dept. of Planning and Development, re meeting to be held in Peterborough May 26th, and enclosing credential for representative to take to the meeting. Bell Telephone Co., re telephone exchange group ratings. Dominion Bureau of Statistics, re municipal payroll for 1958. Dept. of Mines and Technical Surveys, re enclosing map with the two places marked where they plan to drill this

summer. Ontario Municipal Board, with approval of application to purchase Austin Western Motor Grader, model pater 300 snow plow and wing. Elliott & Chandler, re tax certificate Lot 11, Con. 3. Ont. Municipal Association, requesting reservations be made early for convention. City of Hamilton, re relief Guy and Ann Dunlop. Mrs. F. Gwilliam, information re building. Mr. Vincent Jones, informing that house on his property formerly owned by Wm. Johnston had been removed April 21st, 1959. Peterborough City Hospital, re indigent.

On motion of Councillors Farrow and Burns that Reeve L. A. Hooton be the representative to the Welfare Convention, if unable to attend that the Clerk be the representative. Carried.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Farrow that the Reeve and Clerk be the representatives to the

Ontario Municipal Convention. Carried.

On motion of Councillors Burns and Farrow that correspondence be received and filed, Clerk to answer any not already dealt with. Carried.

Mr. L. W. Smith addressed the Council re a grant for the Millbrook Agricultural Society for the Spring Show June 10. On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Stewart that the usual grant of \$200 be given to the Agricultural Society for 1959 show. Carried.

Mr. R. I. Fallis addressed the Council as representative from Durham County H.S. Board, asking for approval of issuing debentures for a High School in Darlington Township, one in Millbrook, and one in Clarke Township when site is decided on.

On motion of Councillors Stewart and Farrow that the Council of the Corporation of Township of Cavan, approve of the building of two new High Schools, one in the Village of Millbrook and one in the Township of Darlington, and the building of the Orono High

School be left in abeyance until the site has been finally decided on. Carried.

A delegation consisting of the Township School Board South Area, namely W. Gillis, Eric Fallis, W. Seward, Jas. Young and Gerald Armstrong addressed the Council re resolution passed at their meeting of April 8th, requesting the Council of the Township of Cavan, to pass a By-law by July 1st to unite the South Cavan School Area and S.S. No. 11 of the Village of Millbrook into one area.

The Reeve asked the Board if they ever considered the building of a consolidated School for the South Area, considerable discussion followed, no action taken.

On motion of Councillors Stewart and Burns that the Clerk be authorized to sign order for new grader.

The regular meeting Council of the Town of South Monaghan was held at the Township Hall on May 19, 1959, at 8.30 p.m.

All members were present with Reeve Dean presiding. Minutes of the previous regular and special meetings read by the Clerk and on motion by Councillor Jones seconded by Jay Vinton.

Mr. Percy Gooding, inspector for the Unit of Northumberland County Durham interviewed the Council in his official capacity. He gave a report of his inspection of the Township explained how the Unit will pay half of the material for farmers' buckthorn and barberry. The Department of Highways will pay half of the material to the Township for spraying roadsides.

Mr. Harry Larmer, fly inspector reported that he had dredged and eighty-six feet of the river had been sprayed for warble. He advised that the warble inspector demands that the ed cattle must be sprayed second time.

Mr. Melville Heaslip, foreman presented volume 4 in the amount of \$1. After due consideration accounts this was paid on motion by Fisher seconded by Heaslip.
