

## Meet The Liberal Candidate

Edward R. "Ted" Woodyard the Liberal candidate in the coming provincial election for Durham, has had an outstanding career in municipal and township affairs, and also in the United Counties Council of Northumberland and Durham.

He was born in Toronto and is the son of the late Walter and Gertrude Woodyard.

He was raised by his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. William Halfacre in Darlington after his mother died when he was only five years old. He attended Tyrone School for his entire Public School education. Due to circumstances he was later forced to leave High School and return to the farm where he conducted and helped with the farm work when his grandparents were in ill health.

Ted Woodyard was self educated having to take several night courses. He specialized in courses in human relations which has been a great asset in his recognized ability to deal with people in all walks of life and to understand them.

Mr. Woodyard has had a varied work and business experience. He has worked in the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, Bowmanville, as a rubber worker. He left the Goodyear to establish the first appliance store in Durham County. This was in 1937 when he opened a shop in Orono entirely devoted to appliances.

A few years later Mr. Woodyard was elected Deputy-Reeve of Clarke Township. In the following year he was elected reeve and became the youngest reeve to serve the twp. He also for some time was the youngest member of the United Counties Council. In this capacity he was recognized for his fairness and understanding of all Counties Council problems. On several occasions he was called on as mediator when deadlocks formed, and chaired closed meetings to settle disputes on various subjects arising in the Counties Council. He was often called "the peacemaker."

Mr. Woodyard served as chairman of the Health Unit, and the High School Consultative Committee for both counties. During his several years as a member of the United Counties Council he was also chairman of the assessment committee, and other important committees.

On retiring from Counties Council Mr. Woodyard was elected chairman of the Orono Hydro Commission, and later chairman of the Orono Police Trustees. He served in these capacities for several years. For the last few years Mr. Woodyard has concentrated on his appliance business in Orono and Bowmanville.

A few years ago Mr. Woodyard covered all the rural schools in Durham County for the Federation of Agriculture showing educational motion pictures on farming and industry. The films were supplied by the National Film Board and there were motion pictures for both primary and adult education. At each presentation of the films Mr. Woodyard was the commentator.

In 1936 Mr. Woodyard married Miss Elsie Underwood, Clarke Township. They have one daughter, Anee, age 18, and a son, Edward, 8 years old. Mr. Woodyard is a member of the United Church, He is a member of the Masonic and Odd Fellows lodges. For many years he was active in the Orono Chamber of Commerce, and was president of this organization for 5 consecutive years.

Mr. Woodyard has been exceedingly interested in matters of policy regarding the future of Ontario. He has worked hard with the provincial Liberal leader John Wintermeyer, in connection with different points of the present Liberal platform. He has held several meetings with committees in Toronto regarding education. He is particularly interested in sections of the Liberal platform concerning help to small

business operators and concerns, also benefits for agriculture and labour.

Mr. Woodyard has been actively interested in the Liberal Party for many years. In 1949 he was campaign manager for John M. James when Mr. James was first elected to represent Durham in the federal parliament. Since that time Mr. Woodyard has held several offices in the Durham Liberal Association of which he is past president.

Mr. Woodyard's hobbies are hunting and fishing. He was a member of the Toronto Revolver Club for several years.

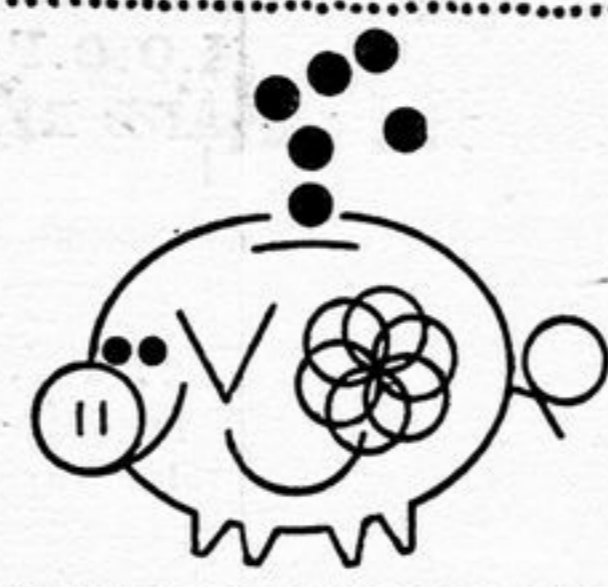

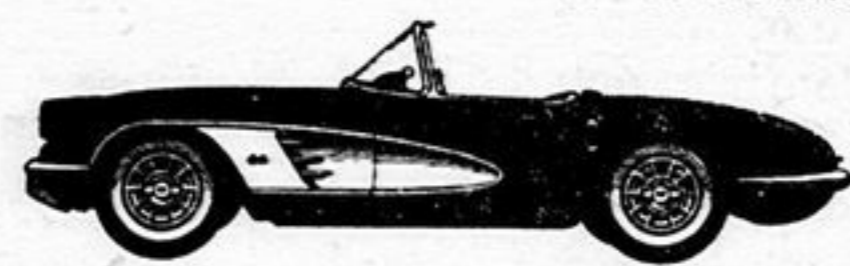
