Peterboro Market.
From the Review.
There was a fair market Saturday morning. In grain a few loads of wheat were offered, spring selling at 67c. One load of oats sold for 36c but this was on a "run." They were quoted at 34c to 35c. No peas or barley were offering, although the latter were quoted at 60c for small and 64c for mummies. On the market butter sold from 18c to 22c and eggs at 10c and 11c. In poultry chickens were scarce at from 40c to 70c and turkeys from 75c to \$1.50. Pork sold at 7c to 8c per lb and veal from 5c to 6c. Potatoes were quoted at from 70c to 80c and apples from 75c to \$1.

The celebration of Her Majesty's Birthday in Port Hope was very quiet yesterday. A number attended the horse races and athletic sports at the town park, the majority of our people took advantage of the cheap rates and fine day to visit the neighboring towns.
