MONTREAL, June 19.—The following verdict has been rendered by the coroner's jury on the Edy tragedy at Clarenceville: "That the deceased came to their death at the hands of persons unknown." Except for unforeseen accidental discoveries this may virtually be considered the last of the affair, and the Beech Ridge murders will go down in the annals of crime as the most mysterious tragedy which ever occurred in Canada.

COUNTIES COURT.

Manchester Buck's Punishment for Seducing his Sister-in-Law—Dr. Corbett's Assailant—Four True Bills Found against the Hagerman's Cornet White Caps. Cobourg World

At the spring assizes in 1891, a true bill found in the case of Regina vs. Manchester Buck, who was charged with seduction under the Charlton Act. The defendant jumped his bail and skipped across to the States, but a month ago he was apprehended and lodged in goal. At the sessions of the peace on Wednesday he pleaded guilty to the charge on which an indictment had been found against him. He said he had a wife, a child and a stepmother to support and that he went across the line because he had been informed that a certain person was going to shoot him if he did not get out. He created a ripple of laughter by saying that this was the first time he had been in court, and when he got out this time he never would be in again. The Judge said that seduction was until recently a civil offence, but it was a heinous offence against the morals of a community, and in this case was more than usually so, because the seduction girl was a sister of the prisoner's wife. However, owing to a number of mitigating circumstances, not the least among which were the reports he (Judge Benson) had heard concerning the character of the girl, he would be lenient with the defendant and sentenced him to only three months imprisonment in the county goal. Buck was very profuse in his thanks to the Judge and seemed overjoyed at being dealt with so leniently.

In the case of Regina vs. Josiah Mallett, the defendant pleaded guilty to common assault. It seems there had been a dispute about some land and Mallett, having heard that Dr. Corbett of Port Hope had undertaken to fence in the said land, flew into a violent passion and attacked the doctor with a stick. The Judge said that the defendant was from all accounts, a hardworking industrious man, who had unfortunately lost control of himself on this occasion. He warned Mallett against thus losing command of his temper and told he should be thankful he had not inflicted more serious injury than he did. He sentenced him to pay a fine of \$25. Mr. J. W. Kerr was Crown prosecutor. Mr. White of Port Hope appeared for Mallett.

The Grand Jury brought in the following findings:— Queen vs. Henry Yelland and Robert Jewell—unlawful assembly. True bill. Queen vs. Robert Jewell—common assault. No bill. Queen vs. Henry Belland and Robert Jewell—demanding money with menaces. No bill. Queen vs. John Newton, unlawful assembly. True bill. Queen vs. Geo. McEvers and Fred Ough, unlawful assembly. True bill. The Judge announced that the Crown Attorney had decided to traverse all the petit jury cases to the Assizes and dismissed the petit jurymen.
