

Achievement Day June 6th

The Millbrook 4-H Calf Club members will be holding their Achievement Day, at the fair grounds at Millbrook on Saturday, June 6th, at 1.30 P.M. The Millbrook Fair, will actually be held on the Wednesday, June 10th., but in view of the fact that a number of the students are writing exams, the achievement day is being held the previous Saturday. The members however, who do not have to write exams will be taking their calves to the fair on Wednesday and will be given additional prize money at that time to make up for some of the added trouble, that they have had in getting to the Achievement Day and also to the fair.

The Millbrook Calf Club is, we believe larger this year, than it has been for some time and under the leadership of Mr. Mervin Smith, Cavan, the members have done an excellent job. The judge of the Achievement Day, will be Mr. LeRoy Brown, Agricultural Representative, for Victoria County from Lindsay. It is hoped that the show can get underway at 1.30 p.m. when the girls and boys will show their calves and also be judged on their showmanship. Following that, we will total up the results and announce the final standing. Those that can be at the fair on Wednesday, will be paraded in front of the grandstand with the calves on the basis of their standing in the overall club.

This club was organized back in January and it has 18 members in it, this year. In addition, six young people who are, too young to be in club work, have also been attending the meetings and have been looking after calves at home and will also be completing on their own.

The members of the calf club, have in addition to attending a number of meetings, where they have been given instructions in judging, preparing their calf for exhibit, feeding, etc, been looking after the calves at home. They have to train them to lead and they are given points for exhibition the calf, for the showmanship, for the care and feeding methods, which we note at the time of visit, for judging, answering questions, attendance at meetings and forwarding feed reports. These various sections add up to a total of 1000 points and the final standing as well as the prize money is based on the overall score.

Durham County H.S. Board

The Board met at Orono on May 20th, under the Chairmanship of R. R. Waddell, Vice-Chairman. All the Board were present except the Chairman,

Allan Strike and two other members.

Resignations were accepted from Mrs. Bennett of Bowmanville and W. W. Watt, Princi-

pal of Orono High School. Mr. Watt has been appointed Principal of a large District School at Bancroft.

The Board is to meet the Consultative Committee of County Council at Orono, May 28th, at 8.00 p.m. This Committee was set up at the request of Bowmanville and Darlington to consider whether the District should be divided into smaller units. The general opinion expressed by members of the Board was that the District should be left at least as large as it is. A resolution was carried to the effect that the Board would not favour the division of the area. The resolution is to be sent to the Consultative Committee.

The contract for the construction of a Boys' Dressing Room at Bowmanville was awarded to Ernest Laird and the contract for decorating one room and the basement hall at Bowmanville was awarded to W. H. Rowe.

An access platform outside the Port Hope gym is to be ordered. Bowmanville requires 12 typing desks and chairs and Port Hope 3 of each. Approval was given for the order.

The Grade 8 pupils spent part of a day at the High Schools preparatory to attending next year. They are to be given their lunch at Board expense.

Accounts to the amount of \$7,294.32 were approved for payment.
