## INQUEST ON THE BODY OF MRS. KENNEDY.

On Tuesday, July 9th, Dr. Gray of Bailioboro, Coroner for Northumberland and Durham, opened an inquest upon the body of the late Mrs. J. Kennedy, whose sad death was referred to in these columns last week.

The certificate of Dr. Montgomery, who thought an inquest unnecessary, Dr. Gray, the Coroner, also giving his opinion that none was required, the Coroner's Crown Attorney instructed the body to be exhumed, which was accordingly done. Dr. T. W. Greer of Peterborough and H. A. Turner of Millbrook were instructed to make a post-mortem and upon the opening of the inquest the following jury was empaneled—David Armstrong, foreman; John Johnson, John Johnston, Wm. Woods, S. J. Melroy, J. B. Kennedy, Wm. Gainer, Thos. Beatty, Wm. Waite, Jas. Wilson, Wm. Hanna, R. J. Doak.

After viewing the body the inquiry was adjourned until Thursday, 11th, (to-day) to await the report of the physicians, when the mystery of the most sorrowful occurrence that has happened in this district for some time, may be expected to be, if not fully explained, made more satisfactory to the bereaved husband and friends and interested community. Various rumours of foul play and criminal negligence of those who left the rails lying so closely to the road are current, but as yet they are only rumours.

## MANEERS COUNCIL.

The council met on Saturday, July 6th, members all present, minutes of last meeting read and approved.

The following petitions were presented and read—Joseph Perrin, closed and a part of lot 1, Con. 7, Manvers; closed and a part of lot 1 on the east side of said lot opened instead thereof.

On motion the petition of Joseph Perrin was referred to the Councilor Stanton.

Moved by Mr. Stanton, seconded by Mr. Henderson, that the petition of T. W. Evans and others be received and that this council will accept a new road on East side of lot 1, Con. 7, and pass the necessary by-law to open as such new road, and a surveyor's report to that effect, together with a good title and required to be given to this council.

Mr. William Myers and Mr. Benjamin McGill being present to bridge lot 4, Con. 14, the council adjourned for one hour, at the expiration thereof the council adjourned.

Mr. William Magee made his report, deciding that the council should pay to Mr. Benjamin McGill the sum of \$200 in full of all demands for building the bridge on Manvers, in 1894.

Moved by Mr. Stanton, seconded by Mr. Henderson, that the report of Mr. Wm. McGee be received and adopted and that the Receiver sign an order on the treasurer in favor of Benjamin McGill for the sum of \$200.00 in full for building said bridge.

A communication from the County Treasurer, stating that the amount of \$1,600 for County Rate and \$394 for School Rate would have to be raised by a rate.

Verbal applications were then made by Wm. Ridge, overseer, and James Webb, to have material furnished to build wire fence on diverted road, Lot 11, Con. 1, piece of stump-fence thereby preventing driving of snow in winter, and by Wm. Ridge, overseer, for such fence, three days extra labour performed by J. Webb during winter season of 1894-5.

On motion Councillor Stanton was appointed to make enquiries as to cost for material requisite to make fence as applied for, and on motion an order for \$2 was signed by the Receiver in favor of W. Ridge, to pay for extra labour.

The complaint of Mr. John Hawkins, stating that on the road division over which W. H. Parker is overseer, persons drawing gravel did not draw sufficient gravel, and as a rater, objected to the payment for such gravel, was then presented and read.

On motion communication of Mr. W. Hawkins was laid over to consult with the overseer.

The Receiver verbally reported that he had attended a conference of the Reeves of Cavan, Millbrook and South Monaghan, with reference to making certain alterations required by the Judge to be made to the Division Court Room at Millbrook, and that he had with the others agreed to contribute one-third of the expense incurred in connection therewith, according to the assessed value of the different municipalities concerned, provided the corporation of Millbrook agreed not to collect any amount to which we may be liable for on account of such Division Court for the next five years, such arrangement being subject to ratification by this council.

Moved by Mr. Stanton, seconded by Mr. Vance, that the Receiver's report be received and adopted.

Moved by Mr. Stanton, seconded by Mr. McIndoo, that Deputy Reeves Henderson and Vance be authorized to sign orders out of session during temporary absence of Reeve Carri.

Mr. Stanton gave notice that he will at next session introduce a bill to levy and collect certain rates and taxes, including Manvers for the current year, also to appoint a collector of rates and taxes in and for said township.

The Receiver then signed a number of orders on the Treasurer and the council adjourned.
