To mark the Centenary of the Hymn "What A Friend We Have In Jesus," a Centenary Service will be held at the grave of the author Joseph Scriven, at the Pengelly Farm, Bailieborough, South Monaghan, on Sunday, September 8th, 1957 at 3 p.m.

The Service will be conducted by the President of the Ministerial Association, Rev. W. H. Heustin, B.A., Grace Presbyterian Church, Millbrook.

The guest speaker will be Rev. Alexander Chisholm, M.A. A.T.C.L., a minister of The Church of Scotland, and Lecturer in Church Music at the Scottish Universities.

Rural Choirs will lead the Praise. In the event of inclement weather, the Service will be held in Christ Church, Bailieborough. There will be an offering to defray expenses.

All interested are invited to attend.

Joseph Scriven was born in Ireland at Seapatrick, County Down, on September 10th 1820. He was a graduate of Trinity College, Dublin. At the age of twenty-five, he went to Canada and settled there at Rice Lake, and afterwards at Port Hope, Ontario. He died August 10, 1886.

A monument to his memory was erected by the people of the district and unveiled on May 24th, 1920.

The Hymn "What a Friend we have in Jesus" was written about 1857 and is undoubtedly the most popular Canadian contribution to the Hymnery of the Church.

The Scriven Shrine, overlooking Rice Lake, is carefully tended by Mr. and Miss Pengelly, and may be reached from Highway 28, by turning east

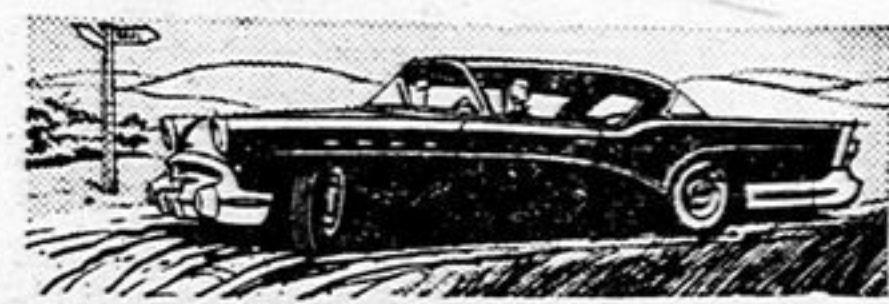

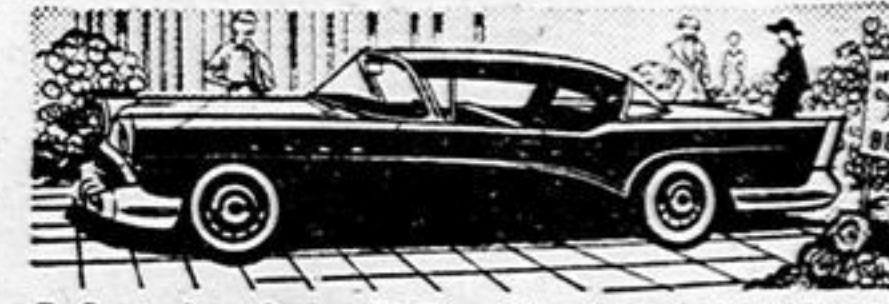
