MR. FOOTE RESIGNS

It is to be regretted that ill health has forced the resignation of the Provincial Minister for Reform Institutions, the Hon. John Weir Foote, V.C., the reverend and gallant member for Durham. But in truth it was not surprising that he should have resigned the post, for it has been obvious for some time that he was not at home with it. Earlier this year in a debate on his Department in the Ontario Legislature there was a certain amount of uneasiness, even on the Conservative benches, that Mr. Foote was becoming overworked in defence of his policies.

Mr. Foote was forced to beg the Legislature to stem its criticisms of penal institutions and the way they were being run because, he said, reports of the debates reached the inmates and "weakened the ability of the staff to handle them." At the time Mr. Foote invited anyone to take his place if he thought they could do the job better. The Examiner sounded a note of caution following this debate, saying that it would be better to demonstrate that the Province's reform institutions were being well operated and in that way disperse criticism rather than try to suppress it.

FOREST FIRES ON INCREASE IN CANADA DURING MONTH OF MAY

A near-record number of forest fires for the month of May burned 86,000 acres of forest throughout Canada, the Federal Forestry Branch, Department of Northern Affairs and National Resources, reported recently.

Warm, dry weather was partly responsible for the 1,750 forest fires reported during May—only slightly less than the 1,875 fires that raged in May, 1950, the worst May for forest fires on record.

Although there were many fires, total damage was far less than in May, 1956 when 736,000 acres were burned by 1,567 fires.

Forest fire research officers said fires often take a heavy toll during May because the new green growth has not developed enough to have a dampening effect on the forest litter in which most fires start and spread.

National forest fire statistics, assembled by the Forestry Branch with the co-operation of the provincial and territorial governments, show that there have been more fires to date this year than last. So far, during only two months of the fire season, there have been 2,200 fires compared to 1,600 during April and May of 1956.

ONTARIO PEACH GROWERS SPONSOR "PEACH RECIPE CONTEST"

Canadian housewives will have an opportunity this year to show-off their favorite peach recipes.

The Ontario Peach Growers Co-operative announced today that it is sponsoring a "Peach Recipe Queen" contest this year with the top award providing for a round trip for two to Banff Springs Hotel, Banff, Alberta, with a stay at the hotel for one week.

The contest is open to anyone who sends in a peach recipe to the Ontario Peach Growers Co-operative.

The prizes this year are considerably larger than those offered in former years for peach recipe winners. Last year over 600 housewives sent into the Peach Co-operative their favorite recipe.

Top winner last year was Mrs. Greta Wengler of Toronto, who at one time was an interior-decorator and who recently returned to her homeland, Denmark. Second prize went to Mrs. M. Burleigh of Napanee, Ontario. Mrs. Wengler's recipe was for peaches with chicken, while Mrs. Burleigh sent in a delightful peach pie recipe.

The 1957 contest's second prize is for \$250., with a third prize of \$100. and 10 other prizes for \$10. It is quite likely that Canadian housewives will hear a lot about this year's peach recipe winners and their recipes. An extensive program is being planned in connection with the awarding of the prizes for the top peach recipes.

Dear Sir: In writing "letters to the Editor" I have made it a rule to acknowledge my responsibility by having my name printed with the letters I write. I do not generally reply to "letters to the Editor" which are anonymous. However, in the case of "The Voice of Millbrook" of July 4th, as the letter is cut off without the name of the writer notwithstanding its "Dear Mr. Editor" the omission being apparently due to an error of the Editor, or a lapse of the linotypist, or perhaps a prank of the printer's devil, I shall reply to one or two points.

Assuming that the letter was written by the Versifier I wish to express my appreciation for his or her reply to my letter but for the life of me I cannot see how God can in any way or to any degree be held responsible for such a colossal evil as war.

I regret that the Versifier is not more hopeful of democracy. My criticism was that democracy is by no means triumphant as proclaimed in the Verse. It is time that Christian people rid themselves of the spurious ideas of apocalypticism and got down to the business of implementing the teaching of Jesus regarding God and man in the organization of human society for only in that way can Christ come and abide with humanity.
