

New Minister Inducted At St. Andrew's

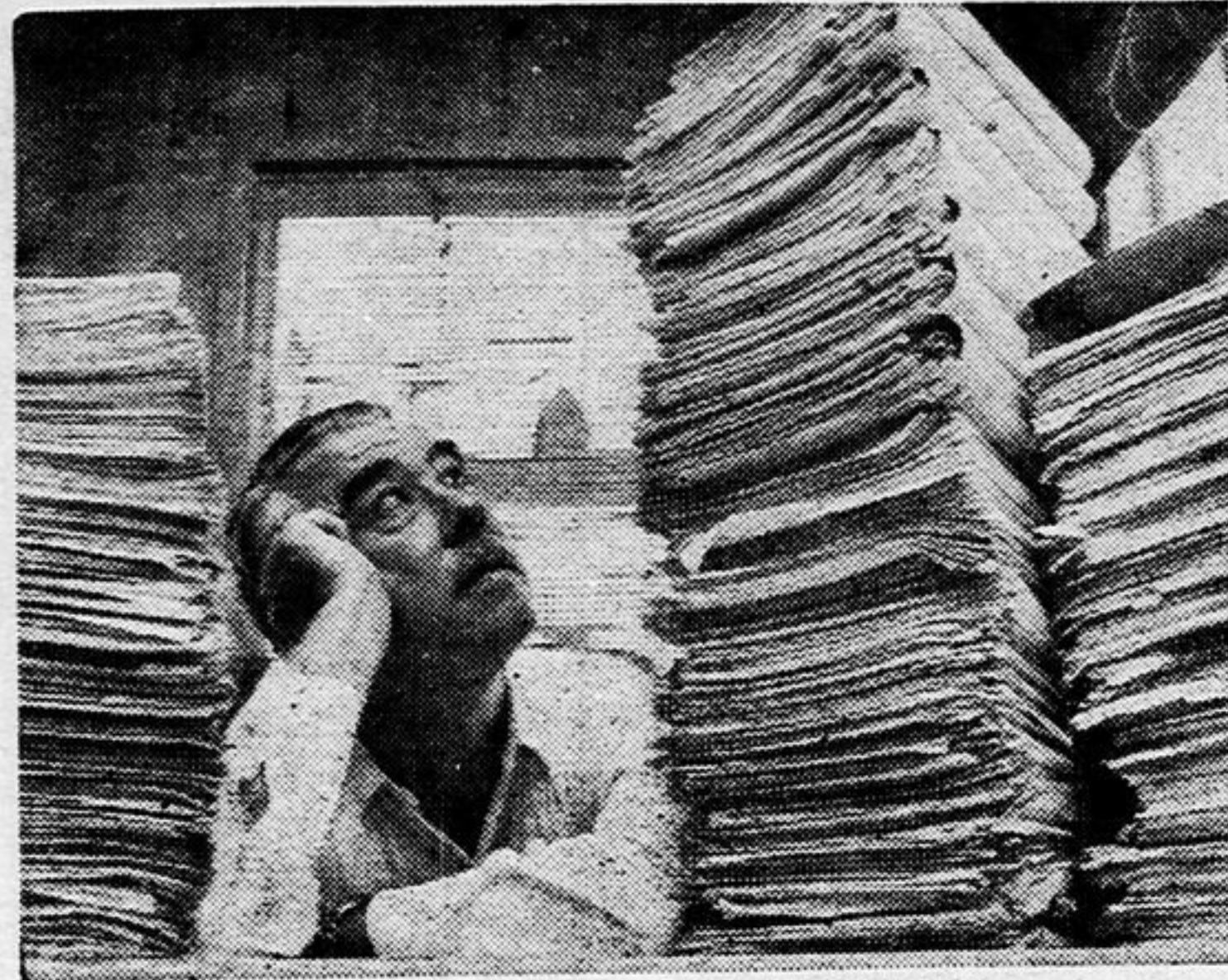
The Rev. Stanley E. Snowden, B.A., B.D., formerly of Baneroff was inducted as minister of St. Andrew's United Church Millbrook, and Cavan United Church, in St. Andrew's Church on Tuesday evening, June 30th, 1959. The induction service was conducted by the Rev. Gordon S. Maxwell of Trinity Church, Peterborough, Chairman of the Peterborough Presbytery. Assisting him were the Rev. A. W. Osborne, B.A., of Lakefield, who gave the Scripture readings and the Rev. L. J. Hardy, B.A., of Bridgenorth, who offered the prayer.

The Rev. J. Fullerton, B.A., M.A., of Keene, preached the sermon from the text in Acts "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock over which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers to feed the Church of God".

The steps relating to the call were given by the Rev. A. E. Larke, B.A., of Springville. Following the act of induction Mr. Snowden was escorted to his new pulpit from which he pronounced the benediction.

There was a combined choir from Cavan and Millbrook, who sang the anthem "The Lord is in His Holy Temple" under the direction of Mr. Stanley Northrop.

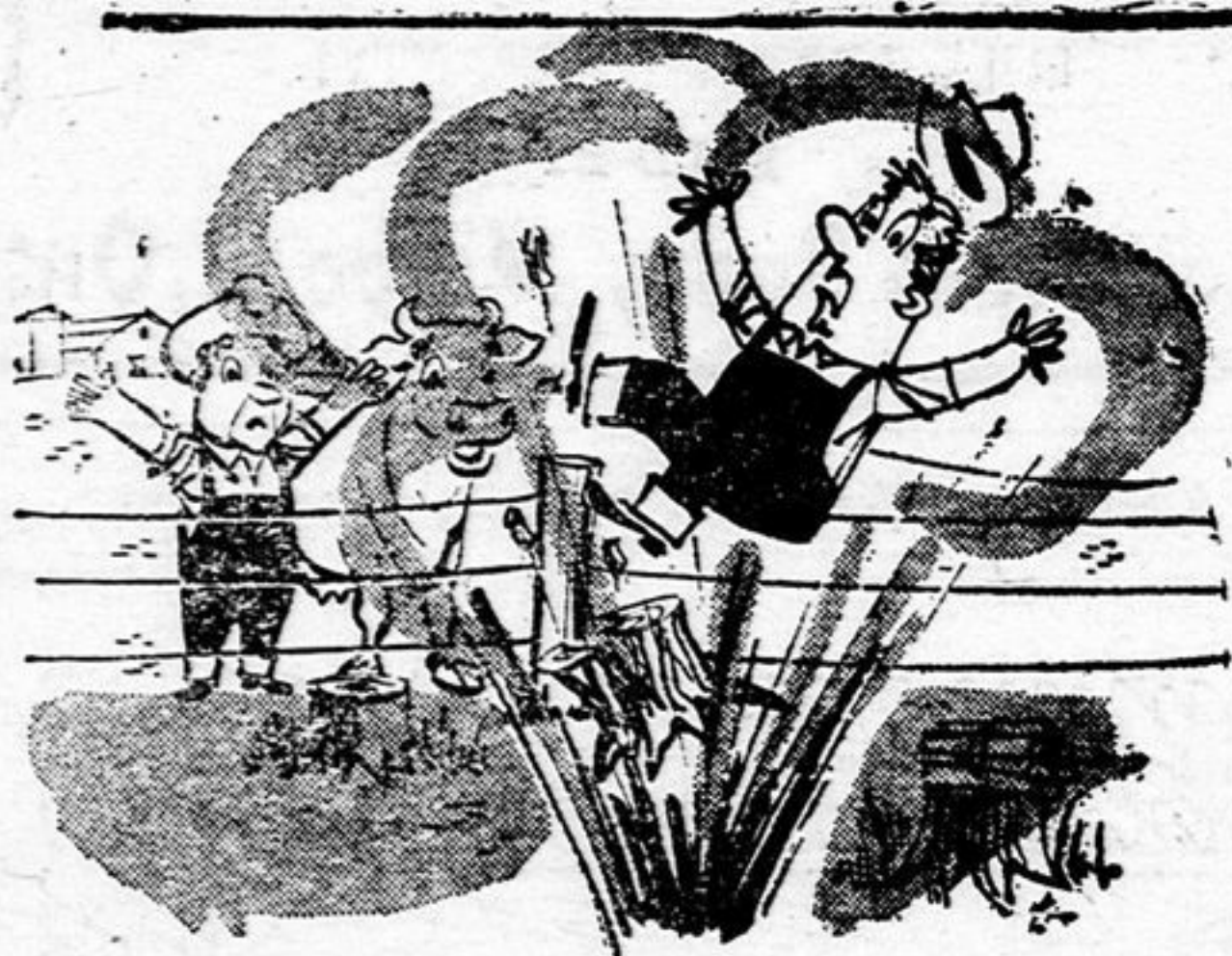
