

Cavan Township Council Minutes

Millbrook, July 8th, 1959.—Cavan Council met in regular session on above date in the Council Chamber at 7.30 p.m. all members present, Reeve L. A. Hooton in the Chair.

Minutes of last regular and special meetings read, on motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Stewart that minutes be adopted as read. Carried.

Mr. Wilbur Lunn addressed the Council re the loss of a heifer due to drinking of water that was polluted, due to the bridge contractor putting dynamite sticks in to blow up the base of creek. When putting the culvert in the fence was down which allowed the heifer to get out on the roadside, and drank of the polluted water. He also asked the Council about gravel, and he felt sure he had a good run on his farm and could supply gravel for the Township.

On motion of Councillors Stewart and Burns that we allow Mr. Lunn \$50. for heifer lost. Carried.

Mr. Donald Graham addressed the Council re a fence that

was broken badly by the Beavertdale Construction Co. when they were hired to snow plow for the Township. He also made mention of the brush along the base of the fence, which was a detriment in holding the snow in winter.

On motion of Councillor Farrow-Burns that the Township clean fence bottom up, and pay half the costs of wire for fence. Carried.

Mr. Archie Matchett addressed the Council re a spring on the road side and asked permission to pipe same into his field re the watering of his cattle. The Reeve asked Mr. Matchett if any one else used the spring, Mr. Matchett said no one else had used same for some time.

On motion of Councillors Burns and Stewart that we grant Mr. Matchett permission to pipe the water from the spring on the North side of road on Con. 8, Lot 6, the pipe to be laid under the culvert to Mr. Matchett's own land. Carried.

Dept. of Public Welfare, enclosing cheque for \$712.90 re Children's Aid.

Clerk-Treas. of United Counties, copy of By-law No. 1867 equalizing the assessment of the various municipalities.

David Rea, re information of land for sale in the Township (over 300 acres) suitable for rehabilitation or reforestation.

Workmen's Compensation, amount of compensation paid.

Willmott-Irvine re date of June 25-26 set for arbitration hearing re Seymour Township of Cavan.

Willmott-Irvine re award

made by Judge Miller of \$4000. to Carman Seymour covering damages for land and severances plus \$500 costs.

Frank Cowan Co. enclosing endorsement to Policy No M.P. 18572 floater equipment. Enclosing endorsement to Policy M-4393, G.M. 5932, No. 5-43965, C-5362 also enclosing payroll report to be filled in.

On motion of Councillors Farrow and Burns that the corporation of the Township of Cavan endorse the Durham County District High School Boards recommendation to build three new high schools in the district. Unanimously carried.

On motion of Councillors Farrow and Stewart that above correspondence be received and filed, the Clerk to answer any not already dealt with. Carried.

A delegation consisting of Mr. Morgan Bigelow, Carl Smith and Carl Porteous addressed the Council re brushing of road on the quarter line west, to enable the School Bus to be able to use that road providing the Board approved of that route.

The Reeve and members of Council all felt they would be able to do any construction on same, as it was not on the road program for this year.

Mr. Anderson and Mr. J. Collins representatives of the Panther Oil Co. waited on the Council re a preparation called Rainseal which their Company had for painting all cement

blocks etc. and advised same for the municipal garage, which would seal cement, and no dampness could penetrate through to the inside.

On motion of Councillors Stewart and Burns that the Clerk notify Mr. Howden that his services would not be required for the present, re foxes, as no foxes were being hunted at the present time, and if any were killed they could bring same to the Clerk's office. Carried.

A discussion arose re the discounts and penalties re taxes.

On motion of Councillors Farrow and Burns that a discount of 2 per cent be allowed on current years taxes, if paid on or before December 15th, and a penalty of 1 per cent added after the 15th day of December to December 31st after that rate interest at the rate of one half of one per cent per month be added. Carried.

On motion of Councillors Burns and Stewart that Clerk introduce certain By-laws.

The Clerk introduced a By-law to raise certain rates for the Township, and to raise monies for the schools in the Townships.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Farrow that rule 37 of the standard rules of procedure be dispensed with.

On motion of Deputy Reeve Bradburn and Councillor Farrow that we go into committee of the whole for second reading of the By-law with blanks filled in.

On motion of Councillors Stewart and Farrow committee rose, Council resumed By-laws read a third time signed, sealed and numbered 1036-1007. Carried.
