

But the time they spend in meetings is but a small part of the time they they must take from their own businesses, or from their leisure, in order to serve. And for these many hours that they give free they get nothing. We suggest that they do something about this condition. We suggest that they use parliamentary rules, for such rules save time. We suggest that they unanimously double their pay. We suggest that they encourage villagers to attend their meetings.

The Council chamber is one of the finest old-fashioned halls in Ontario, and it should be preserved that way, not modernized please. But it needs \$500 work: Spic and Span, Mr. Clean, Bon Ami, linseed oil, Hippo oil. It should not be panted. It should not be painted. It should not be varnished. It should just, be clean. Paint and varnish have already ruined the priceless beauty of too many halls and churches in this county. It is the children's playground that needs the paint.

We are new here. Everyone is new in Millbrook for the first 10 years. We have received eversomany kindnesses. We have done a few.

We call the village beautiful. It is. It is beautiful as a spirited stallion is beautiful. Millbrook has the deepest snows, the heaviest winds, the hottest suns. It may need sidewalks, but it is soon going to need sewers a lot more.

It may need a new high school very much; but it needs industrious scholars a lot more. It may need many things; but with now it needs council meetings that citizens will want to altend; council meetings so conducted that the quiet citizen can be heard; that council is not misled by the loud-mouthed opinions of the rude.
