SPEED CAUSED THIS FATAL ACCIDENT LOCATION: No. 10 Highway, S of Brampton. TIME: 11:25 p.m. ROAD SURFACE: Asphalt. Very greasy because of heavy drizzle. RESULT: Two killed. This car was travelling south at a speed far too high for the road surface condition. The car ahead signalled a left-hand turn, and pumped his brakes to give additional warning because he had to wait for an oncoming car before making his turn. The driver of the high speed car jammed on his brakes and the car went into a violent skid. It shot off the road, clipped a tree, then smashed head-on into another tree.
