

Sunday Morning At St. Andrew's

Sunday, August 24th, 1958, Rev. Victor C. Mooney, M.A., D.D., of Toronto, was in charge. Theme: The Church, the body of Christ, what is it worth to you?

Scripture, Matthew 16:13-18. Whom say ye that I, the Son of man am? And Simon Peter answered and said: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." And Jesus answered, Blessed art thou, Simon Barjona, for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in Heaven. Thou art Peter, and upon this rock, I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

1st. Cor. 12:12—"For as the body is one, and hath many members, and all the members of that one body, being many, are one body: so also is Christ. When Jesus was here on earth, God spoke to us through the body of Christ; and He continues to speak to us through the bodies of believers.

When official representative go around to take the census, many people say they belong to a particular branch of the Christian Church, who are quite unknown to the minister of that church. In the United Church of Canada there are 750,000 such folk, of whom our ministers have no knowledge.

POLIO VACCINATION FOR ADULTS

Up to the present date in 1958 there has been no reported case of poliomyelitis in the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham, according to a statement from the Health Unit. In 1957 one case occurred.

In 1951 there were fifty-one cases, with one death of a middle-aged man.

Twenty thousand children in the United Counties have been given three doses of poliomyelitis vaccine within the past three years by the Northumberland-Durham Health Unit staff. Until this year, because of limited supplies of the Salk vaccine which is produced in Ontario at the Connaught Laboratories, it was issued by the Ontario Department of Health only to medical officers of health for large clinics.

Early in 1958 it became available to private physicians and since then many adults as well as children have received the inoculations from their own doctors.

Attendance at Health Unit clinics has been restricted to children and school teachers. Now that there is enough vaccine and since almost all the children have been protected, Dr. Charlotte M. Horner, Medical Officer of Health, plans to have a series of clinics for adults in Northumberland and Durham counties. Two doses will be given this fall and in May or June of 1959 a series of clinics will be held to give third doses.

Dr. Horner strongly urges that all adults under the age of forty should make sure that they are protected against poliomyelitis, either by visiting their own doctors or by attending one of the clinic centres

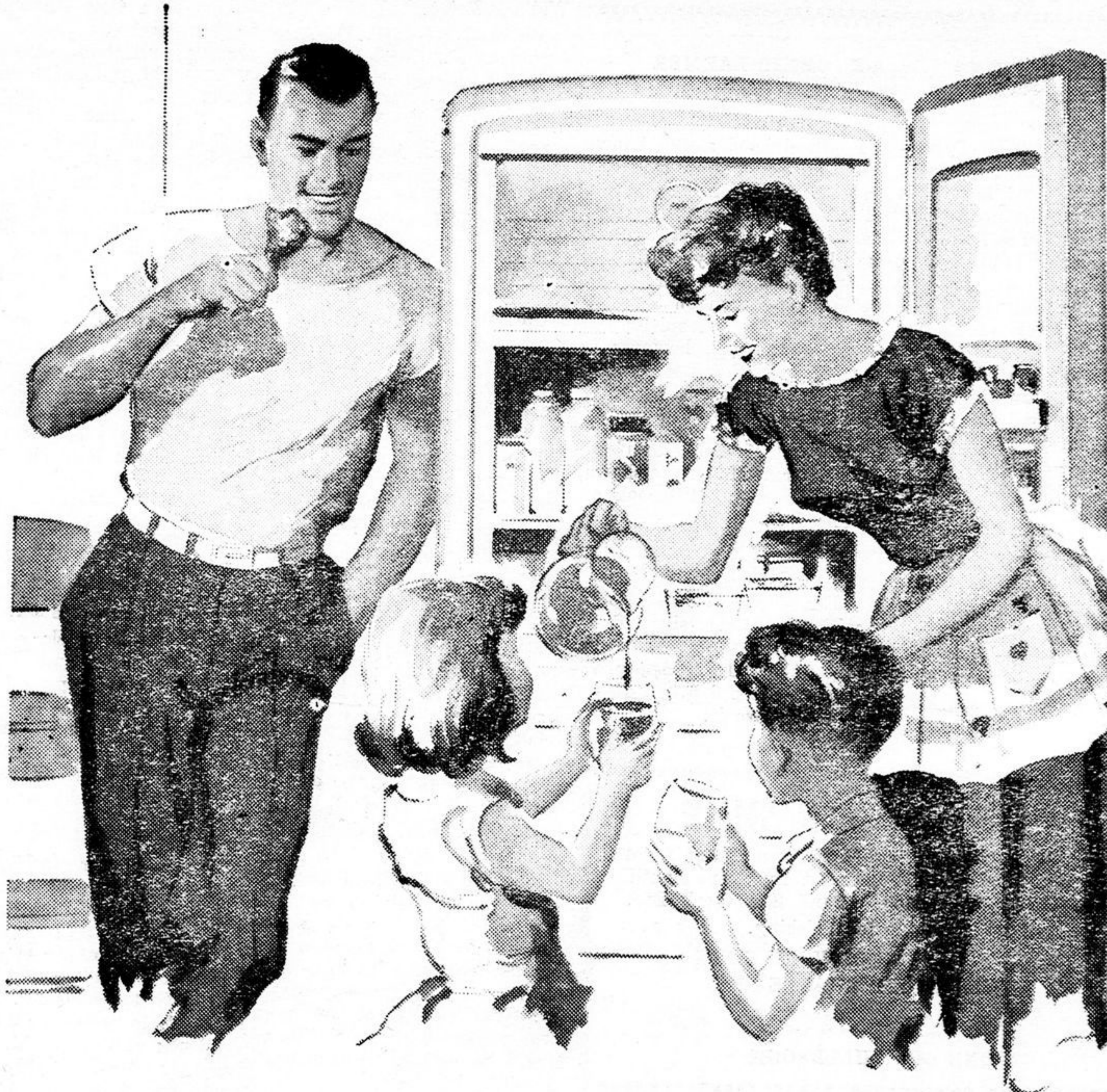

Precision Prefab Products, requesting building copy of local building by-law which was sent. Zurich Construction Ltd., letter of introduction which was filed for future reference. Department of Public Welfare, Toronto, requesting cheque for relief of Jas. Sypher and family which was refused on the grounds that they were not residents of our Municipality long enough to qualify. Municipality of the Village of Millbrook with contract for services of fire truck to apply until the end of 1958; this was agreed to and accordingly a cheque for \$200.00 was mailed.

Hydro Electric, ten new contracts which were approved.
