SOFTBALL

Millbrook girls picked up their first win of the softball finals Monday night defeating Orono girls 16 to 10. The series is now tied at a game apiece and one tie game.

Dorothy Hutchinson lead off hitter for Millbrook, hit a single in her first trip to the plate and was brought home on a triple by Marg Armstrong, a home run by Mary McDowell brought Marg in. The next three batters were put out and the score at the end of the first was 3 to 0 for Millbrook. Millbrook had 3 runs in the second while Orono picked up 3 in the second and 4 in the third to lead 7 to 6 after three innings. Millbrook came back in the fourth inning with 3 runs while Orono was held to 1 run. The score at the end of the fourth was 9 to 8 for Millbrook. Orono was held scoreless in the fifth and sixth while Millbrook scored 4 runs. Millbrook picked up 3 more in the seventh while holding Orono to two.

Marg Armstrong was the big hitter for Millbrook with a homer, 2 triples and a double in five trips to the plate. Mary McDowell also had four for five including a two run homer in the first inning. Dorothy Hutchinson had four for five including a triple and a double, and Lynda Hogg had 2 singles and a double in four trips to the plate.

Eileen Powell enjoyed a well earned rest from her regular pitching duties while Dorothy Hutchinson, pitching her second full game of the season came through with flying colours. Eileen has pitched 22 games this season winning 12 with 9 losses and one tie.

The final score of 16 to 10 sounds like a pretty poor game of softball but it proved to be

a very exciting game to watch. In the fourth inning Mary McDowell came to bat with 2 on base and since Mary had had two good hits in her first two trips to the plate, the Orono pitcher was instructed by her coach to walk her, the Orono pitcher then pitched 3 balls about two feet on the outside while Mary stood fuming in the batter's box, the fourth pitch was also outside so Mary promptly stepped across the plate and drove a line drive past the third baseman. MUD PUPPY, EVER SEE ONE TOWNSHIP OF CAVAN

By-Law No. 994

A By-Law to Raise \$50,000.00 to Aid in the Construction of Tile, Stone or Timber Drains

The Council of the Township of Cavan pursuant to the Tile Drainage Act, enacts as follows: 1. That the Reeve may from time to time, subject to the provisions of this by-law, borrow on the credit of the corporation of the Municipality such sum not exceeding in the whole \$50,000.00 as may be determined by the Council, and may in manner hereinafter provided, issue debentures of the corporation in such sums as the Council may deem proper for the amount so borrowed, with coupons attached as provided in section 4 of the said Act.

2. That subject to section 19 of the Tile Drainage Act, when the Council is of the opinion that the application of any person to borrow money for the purpose of constructing a tile, stone or timber drain should be granted in whole or in part, the Council may, by resolution, direct the Reeve to issue debentures as aforesaid and to borrow a sum not exceeding the amount applied for, and may lend the same to the applicant on the completion of the drainage works.

3. A special annual rate shall be imposed, levied and collected over and above all other rates upon the land in respect of which the money is borrowed, sufficient for the payment of the principal and interest as provided by the Act.

Read a first and second time this 20th. day of June, 1958.

This notice was first published on the 14th. day of August 1958, and the last publication will be on the 28th. day of August 1958.
