in Concession 9 of Cavan Township.

John, the oldest brother, came out in 1822 with his wife and several children. John bought Lot 5 in the 9th Concession, but lived there only a few months, then bought the farm north of Richard's Lot 14 in the 10th Concession of Cavan.

In the Spring of 1823, Thomas and the rest of his children and 44 grandchildren arrived, and settled mostly in Cavan. During the voyage, Thomas' wife Jane Bell died at sea.

Samuel, the third son, settled near Baltimore, where James had a farm. He moved to Leskard in Clarke Township with his seven boys and one daughter.

Thomas had 10 children and 73 grandchildren, who have spread out over Canada and the United States. It is estimated there are in the neighborhood of 10,000 descendants.

About 500 attended the memorial service conducted by the Presbyterian Church of Bobcaygeon.

The organist was William Staples of Toronto, who is 20. The choir of 14 consisted of nine of the ten branches of the original family.

Fletcher Staples of Toronto and his daughter, now Mrs. Howard Cox, sang two duets and Mrs. Cox sang a solo. Richard Matchett of RR 2 Fraserville, born in 1872, was the oldest mem-

ber of the choir.

The ushers were Staples descendants, C. Rodwell McFadden of Brantford and William Honey of Dartford.

At the service, all 10 branches of the Staples clan were represented, and included at least four fourth generation Staples: Clark Staples of Oshawa, John Staples, Lindsay, Mrs. Walter Rowland (Ella Staples), Bethany, Fletcher Staples, Toronto.

Members were from Vancouver and Haney, B.C.; Carievale, Sask.; Dorval, Que.; Sarnia, Kitchener, Brantford Hamilton, Oakville, Bracebridge, Lindsay, Peterborough, Fenelon Falls, Bobcaygeon, Port Hope, Cobourg and many other places in the United Counties.

The family tree has nine generations.

T. Christopher Staples of Baltimore, president of the clan, extended a welcome to all and expressed thanks to all who had helped to make the reunion a success.

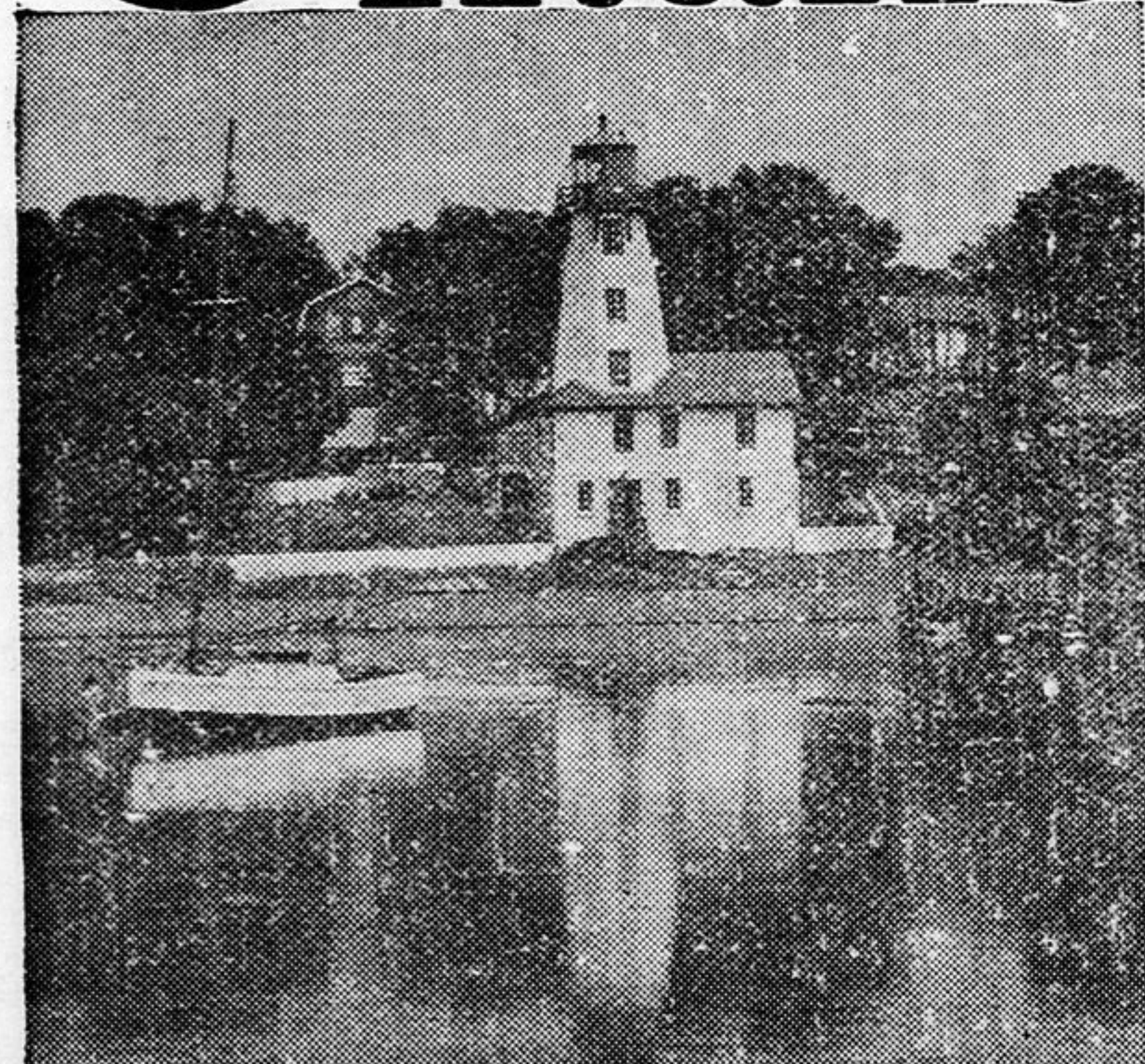
