TOPICS OF A WEEK. Five empty rowboats were picked up by steamers near Syria on Friday. At Little Rock, Ark., Judge Wilson has dismissed, at the city's cost, the charge against a Mrs. Noe for appearing on the street in bloomers.

Masked burglars are operating in Quebec. Scarlet fever is becoming prevalent in Winnipeg. A crisis in Montreal's financial affairs is threatened.

The Grand Duchess of Oldenburg is dead at Berlin. An exhibition building is to be erected at Bogota for foreign and domestic products.

Huaningto, Mexico, has been flooded by a cloudburst. A dozen persons were drowned. A German torpedo boat capsized in the North sea on Wednesday, and thirteen persons were drowned.

The British Government has decided not to make any further enquiry into the condition and progress of the Scotch crofters who emigrated to Saltcoats, Canada.

Four thousand additional laborers have joined in the Dundee (Scotland) millworkers' strike. It is estimated that fully 30,000 persons are now idle because of this strike.

A resolution has been presented by the municipality of Panama, asking the other municipalities of Colombia to recognize the Cuban patriots as belligerents.

It is reported at Charlotte, N. C., that a party of seven, five men and two women, are missing from Cape Bauld.

Shareholders of the Commercial Bank of Newfoundland have been called upon to pay the reserve liability of \$200 per share.

Government Engineer Schreiber reports satisfactory progress on both the Peterboro' and Balsam Lake sections of the Trent Valley canal.

Wallaceburg now numbers among her industries a glass blowing establishment. It promises to be a large addition to the town, employing, as it does 250.

Counsel for Gauthier, who murdered the young girl Comery, has presented a petition to the Attorney-General for Gauthier's examination as an alleged lunatic.

John Glenn, of Aurora, was arrested and brought to Toronto, charged with fire to the freight shed of the G.T.R. at Aurora.

Mrs. Charles Graham, of Buffalo, who several weeks ago fell over the bank at Niagara Falls into the gorge, owing to a defective guard, has entered suit against the Queen Victoria Park Commissioners for \$5,000 damages.

Ganagoche is to have a new summer hotel. Business failures throughout the Dominion this week number 42, as against 40 same week last year.

Kingston is seeking to secure a concentration of the G.T.R. work shops at Belleville and Brockville. The liabilities of the Canada Suspender Company, at Quebec, amount to \$34,000 and assets \$19,000.

It is understood that the Federal and Provincial Governments will be asked to make grants for the work. Shareholders of the collapsed Commercial Bank of Newfoundland have been advised by counsel that they are not bound to pay the reserve liability.

Major-General Gascoigne, the new Commander-in-Chief of the Canadian militia, has taken passage by the Allan line steamship Parisian, which sails for Montreal on September 19.
