

Cavan Council met in regular session on above date in the Council Chamber, all members present, Reeve L. A. Hooton in the Chair.

Minutes of last regular and special sessions read, on motion of Councillors Cathcart and Deputy Reeve McKnight, that minutes of both meetings be adopted as read. Carried.

On motion of Deputy Reeve McKnight and Councillor Howden, that we hear Mr. Donaldson to the Consumers Gas Co. before our communications are read. Carried.

Mr. Donaldson of the Consumers Gas Company addressed the Council re the granting of their Company the Franchise of distributing gas in the Township of Cavan, also if we were ready for the first reading of the By-Law, as their Company were anxious to get By-Law put through for the final reading. Some time was spent with Mr. Donaldson asking him to explain same more fully. The Reeve informed him Cavan Council would like time to give this more study, and to go into same more thoroughly before they passed a By-Law.

A delegation consisting of Mr. Fallis, A. Fallis and E. Fallis addressed the Council, re fire protection. The Reeve informed them the Council as a whole had given this considerable study, but at the present they had no funds for this, as the problem had not arisen until after they had set their mill rate and they had not budgeted for same in this year's taxes.

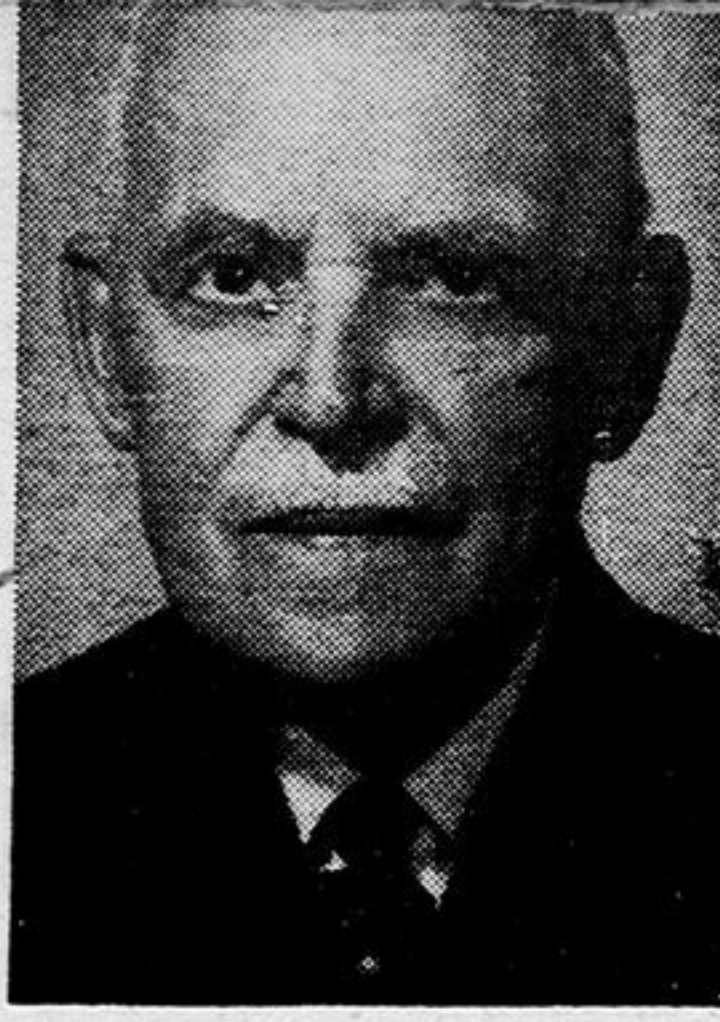
Mr. O. Young addressed the Council, re getting a ditch dug through his property, which he claimed was being flooded in the spring by surplus water from Cavan Township.

Mr. Mesk of the J. C. Hickley & Son Ltd., addressed the Council, re Fyre-Fyter Fire Equipment, this small pumper had been demonstrated in Millbrook on Tuesday evening.

Mr. A. V. Thorn, collector of rates reported in the month of August \$1108.78 had been collected in taxes, but there was still a balance of \$10,075.00 of 1956 taxes outstanding, and felt some pressure should be used to collect same.

On motion of Councillors Bradburn and Howden, that report be received and filed, and collector be instructed to write all delinquents, that if taxes are not paid, action will be taken. Carried.

Attend the Church of your Choice on Sunday.

Rev. Francis Chisholm, M.A., B.D., conducting the service, with his father Rev. Alexander Chisholm, M.A., A.T.C.L., as guest preacher, and Mr. Henry Hayek, newly-appointed organist, and director of the junior and senior choirs, on duty.

The special feature of this service was the Dedication of the new electric organ in memory of those who paid the supreme sacrifice in the first and second World Wars.

In this connection Mrs. G. A. Spicer and Mrs. Lawrence Winslow sang in duet, "Forever with the Lord".

Psalm 150 was chosen as the Old Testament lesson, and Psalm 707 (40th ps.) for the responsive reading.

Acts 16:14-34, was the New Testament selection, all contributing to the effectiveness of the sermon theme "He hath put a new song in my mouth". Psalm 40:3, through which King David gave expressing to his own experience of the saving Graces of God, which lifted him up from a condition of despair, and set his feet upon a rock, and established his goings.

"He hath put a new song in my mouth even praise unto our God; many shall see it, and fear, and shall trust in the Lord".

In Acts 16:14-34, we see the same Power experienced as Paul and Silas, unjustly accused and roughly handled, sang praises unto God at midnight in the inner prison cell at Philippi.

The keeper of the prison, who had listened to many strange sounds, groans and screams, and vile stories from the inmates of that jail, was so deeply impressed by these songs of praise through which Paul and Silas gave expression to their faith in God, that he came seeking such Saving Grace, and responded so readily to the answer to his questions, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved, and thy house, that he took the prisoners the same hour of the night, and washed their stripes; and was baptized."

In the middle ages, St. Francis of Assisi went about expressing his Faith and Joy through spiritual songs such as Hymn 29 in our Hymnary. Martin Luther's hymns of praise were again powerful in the Protestant Reformation. See hymnary No. 397. The Wesleys, especially Charles Wesley, composed many hymns which reached and won many thousands to a Saving Faith. Songs of Faith have still great power in evangelism, as

The Chairman of the Organ Committee, Mr. Moore, presented the financial statement, and the response for the day was encouraging.
