#### HEALTH UNIT CLINICS TO BE HELD DURING NEXT NINE MONTHS

Every child in the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham will be protected poliomyelitis and smallpox, if all parents who have not already had their children adequately immunizer take adayntage of the clinic programe for the next 9 months, stated Dr. Charlotte M. Horner, Medical Officer of Health, Northumberland-Durham Health Unit.

For the past three years poliomyelitis vaccination took precedence. Approximately 21 thousand children have been given two doses of polio vaccine by Dr. Horner and her staff, and 11 thousand of these have been given their third dose. Now it is urgent, Dr. Horner says, to resume clinics at which children may have their immunity to diphtheria brought up to effective level, since, due perhaps to the large number of new Canadians from thickly populated areas of Europe, some eases of diphtheria have recent-But the coach was a rather ly been reported in Ontario.
