How Bill Stopped Fumbling The Ball

The power to believe is the greatest force in a human being. Faith and fear are both a form of believing.

Here's a man whose steps have been dogged by sickness, frustration and failure. Someone tries to encourage him by saying, "Don't be afraid. God will help you." He cries, "No, I don't believe He will. I do not believe anything can help me."

Therefore, his fear is a form of belief. He believes God can't help him.

Faith is believing also. Faith is based upon confidence in God and His power to protect and deliver us. This kind of believing brings that feeling of security. It relaxes the muscles. It removes the knot of fear from the stomach. It controls the emotions and calms the mind.

Bill Thomas was a young high school student and his greatest ambition was to be a football player. In his Junior year, he went out for the team. His tackling was vicious. His courage in meeting any situation of halfback and carried the ball very often.

One day early in his career when the center snapped the ball rather hard, he fumbled. From that hour an insistent

fear plagued him whenever the ball was to come to him. Always he would think, "What if I fumble, what if I drop the ball?" When he was carrying back punts down the field, the same fear would nag him. And he did begin fumbling the ball often. Finally the coach told him that if he kept on fumbling, he would have to take him off the team.

But the coach was a rather keen student of human nature. He took young Bill aside, and this is what he said, "Bill, I know that you are not afraid. Your tackling is too hard and you face the biggest of opponents without one quiver of fear. I would rather have you between an enemy ball carrier and our goal line than anyone else I know. Now, tell me why you drop the ball."

Then Bill told him of his first experience and of the awful fear that kept seizing upon him every time he was called to carry the ball—the fear of fumbling. Then the coach said quietly, "Bill, I want to talk to you and then you talk to yourself. You simply have begun to believe that you are going to fumble. Now, I want you to change your form of believing. From now on whenever the ball is coming to you, I want you to

say with a determination and believe it. 'I will catch the ball; I will not fumble; I will carry the ball!' Then ask God to help you—and He will."

From that moment on, Bill never fumbled again. He became one of the best players in the state. He changed his believing.

These two master emotions, fear or faith will control you. You are what your believing is because you turn all the power of your being completely in the direction of your believing. The difference lies in whether you practice your faith or practice your fear. Fear not. Only believe.

HEALTH UNIT CLINICS TO BE HELD DURING NEXT NINE MONTHS

Every child in the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham will be protected against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis and smallpox, if all parents who have not already had their children adequately immunized take advantage of the clinic programme for the next 9 months, stated Dr. Charlotte M. Horner, Medical Officer of Health, Northumberland-Durham Health Unit.

For the past three years poliomyelitis vaccination took precedence. Approximately 21 thousand children have been given two doses of polio vaccine by Dr. Horner and her staff, and 11 thousand of these have been given their third dose. Now it is urgent, Dr. Horner says, to resume clinics at which children may have their immunity to diphtheria brought up to effective level, since, due perhaps to the large number of new Canadians from thickly populated areas of Europe, some cases of diphtheria have recently been reported in Ontario.

In September, at clinic centers in each township, parents may bring children who have received two doses of poliomyelitis vaccine at least seven months ago. These clinics are particularly for rural children under school age who were given the doses in November and December of 1956.

Starting September 30 every rural school in Hamilton, Percy, Seymour, Brighton, Murray, Darlington and Cartwright Townships will be visited three times, at four week intervals, to give protection against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis and smallpox, to children whose parents request it, and also to infants and preschool children brought to the school. Children under school age are given a combined antigen including whooping cough vaccine.

During the winter similar clinics will be held in the towns and larger villages and in the spring, it is hoped, the remainder of the rural area will be covered.

HERE IS A FIELD NOT ALREADY CROWDED

Young men and women, as they discuss with parents or vocational advisors at school what their lifework shall be, are usually advised to select a field which is not already overcrowded. But without specific information, it is not easy for the student to know what that field might be.

The Canadian Census Classification, under "Professional Service", lists "Osteopathic Physician, Doctor of Osteopathy". Here is a profession which is comparatively new and consequently presents many openings for both young men and women, particularly in the smaller towns of Canada, where there is a great shortage of doctors.

Although yearly net incomes for established Osteopathic Physicians range from \$8000 a year up to \$20,000, there are only about 100 Osteopathic Physicians practising in the whole of Canada. This, then, is one field which is not only uncrowded, but also offers a lucrative living, and is in need of young men and women who have lives, brains, hearts and hands to dedicate to it.

The Osteopathic Physician—while he is highly trained in, and makes full use of, ALL accepted clinical methods of diagnosis and treatment of diseases and injury—places especial emphasis on structural manipulation. This is the art and science of detecting, evaluat-

ing, and then correcting any departures by the body from a normal health. The required training, which is carried on in Osteopathic Colleges, is long, comprehensive and thorough, but gives the graduate professional standing which is recognized all across Canada.
