Last Friday night at the Fairgrounds, before a large crowd, Millbrook girls defeated Orono girls 12 to 8 to take the final series three games to two.

Both teams played quite cautiously for the first five innings, with Orono scoring one run in the third and one in the fifth, while Millbrook scored three in the third, one in the fourth and one in the fifth. Orono scored five runs in the top of the sixth, to take the lead 7 to 5. Millbrook came right back at them with seven runs in the sixth to end the inning at 12 to 7 for Millbrook. Orono called on a pinch hitter for their first batter in the seventh. Quattrill, the pinch hitter, delivered with a triple to right field and came in on a single by Woods. Woods was put out at second and the next two batters fled out to end the game 12 to 8 for Millbrook.

Lynda Hogg came through with the only perfect batting record, picking up 4 hits in 4 times at bat. Dorothy Hutchinson, Marg Armstrong and Mary McDowell each had 3 for 5 while Elaine and Glenda Bain each hit 2 for 4.
