# 140 Laymen Attend Bay Of Quinte Conference

"Fulfil Your Ministry" was the theme for 140 laymen attending the third Annual Bay of Quinte Men's Conference held at Belleville's Albert College last week-end. Ringing through a fast three-day program the theme challenged men from over forty communities in Eastern Ontario.

Dr. J. R. Mutchmor, Secretary of Evangelism and Social Service, complimented Church laymen on the effectiveness of their work, plans and progress in re-vitalizing the role of men in the total program of the Church.

Dealing with the subject "Moral Issues", Dr. Mutchmor said, "when it comes to some major moral issue when we (the United Church) have convictions and others will not pronounce their convictions we must say we will go on alone. But, we should not be bitter, mischievous nor dogmatic". For example, said Dr. Mutchmor, the United Church has taken an official position of "uncomprmising opposition to the liquor trade".

Dr. Muchmor answered extemporaneously questions submitted dealing with subjects ranging from nuclear warfare, total abstinence, settlement of the present beer strike and obscene literature.

"Fifteen million adults learn to read every year-but what do they read? When did you last read a book on religion?, said Morrison Kelly, Professor of Public Worship, Emmanual College, Toronto, "We are faced with people who appear to have never graduated from the Sunday School-people who have to learn to grow up in an understanding Christ. A popular question seems to be-how little can a man believe and still be a Christian!".

Drawing on a new testament figure. Dr. Kelly said, here we have (Epphras) a completely dedicated servant of God! a model of devotion. Only faith which has been authentieally and personally obtainednot a series of hand me downs -can enable us to "fulfil our ministry" as this man did.

The conference was opened by Sid Martin, Frankford, Planning Committee Chairman. Greetings were brought by Dr. A. E. McKenzie, Principal, and Judge J. D. Anderson, Chairman of the Board of Governors at Albert College; Rev. J. F. Lane, President, Bay of Quinte Conference.

"The spirit of this conference is equal to any (in Canada), said Ralph Wilson, Associate Secretary, The Board of Men, "and there is a new vitality coming into the Church through the enthusiasm, interest and concern of 34,000 Churchmen in 806 mens' clubs."
