It is very well written by Patrick Armstrong. It says: "The distinction of being the first settler on the Souris appears to belong to one of two persons.

During the spring of 1880 a James Wiggins arrived at the present site of Souris, Man., built a shanty and put a few acres to the plow.

That same spring a young man from Ontario, George Bell by name, settled in the valley in what was then
