OUR FALL EXHIBITION.

A GRAND SUCCESS—THE GATE RECEIPTS LARGER THAN EVER BEFORE.

Below Will be Found a Full Report of the Prize List.

The East Durham and Cavan Agricultural societies' fall exhibition took place here on Thursday and Friday of last week. To say that it was a success is very weak, as never before since the organization of the county show has the same success crowned the efforts of the officers and directors. The gate receipts amounted to \$387.15, the largest amount ever taken, which clearly demonstrates the fact that the show is now being held in the right place and under the proper management. The entries were also far in advance of former years and many outsiders were loud in their praise and the remark was general that it was the best show held this fall within the united counties. The show of horses was unusually large and the animals themselves were of a very superior class. In heavy draught, general purpose and carriage horses the exhibits were equally good, and reflected great credit on the members of the societies. Cattle, sheep and pigs were also represented by some of the finest specimens of their kind and if we voice the sentiments of those who are capable to judge we can only say that no better exhibit in this line has taken place at larger shows. In the interior of the building the display of cereals, fruits and roots was simply magnificent. Upstairs the exhibit of ladies work, fine arts etc., were unusually large, and drew forth admiring comments from all who visited the department. The handiwork of the ladies showed much careful labor and much attention was given to the numerous landscapes shown by the members of the fair sex. In this department many special exhibits were made and among the more prominent was a show case from the drug store of Dr. H. A. Turner, which was tastefully dressed and with the many illuminated labels presented quite a handsome appearance. Among the large display we noticed "Turner's Cough Syrup," Dr. J. W. Bland's "C.P.R. Liniment," Turner's Frostiline, and many others that we could enumerate if space permitted. About four o'clock in the afternoon of Friday the attention of the crowd naturally drifted towards the new driving park, where speeding in the ring had commenced and as usual was the special
