The entertainment will take place under the auspices of the Presbyterian and St. Thomas' churches.

The annual meeting of the Liberal-Conservative association will be held in the town hall, Millbrook, on Wednesday, November 15, at eight o'clock, p.m., for the purpose of electing officers and delegates for the ensuing year. The officers ask for a full attendance as there will be considerable business of importance to transact.

—The new editor of THE REPORTER and family arrived last Wednesday with their furniture and is now engaged in the delightful task of setting the house in order. If he comes down town with a visage like a smithy and looking daggers at the good-natured citizens just remember he has been putting up stove pipes.

—A change has been made in the matter of fixing thanksgiving day this year. Heretofore the second Thursday in November has been thanksgiving day in Canada, while the fourth Thursday of the same month has been thanksgiving day in the United States. This year the Canadian holiday is fixed for the fourth Thursday of November—the 23rd.

—Nearly everyone is aware that it is wrong to carry concealed weapons, but it is not generally known that you must not come armed within two miles of a public meeting without incurring a penalty of \$100 upon conviction, and if you molest any person returning from a public meeting designedly, either by personal violence or by using opprobrious epithets, you can be fined \$200 or go to jail for six months.

—At the Presbyterian church on Sunday last the Rev. Mr. Bloodworth made special reference to his trip to Chicago. Taking a text suitable to the comparison, he pictured the marvelous skill and ingenuity of man as seen in the magnificent architecture and mechanical progress he has made within the last few years. He drew many pointed and practical lessons directing his hearers to the eternal city whose builder and maker is Him who is the great architect of the universe.

—Scribner's Magazine for November opens with a picturesque and amusing travel sketch by Colonel H. E. Colville, C. B. of the Grenadier Guards, in which he describes his experiences while "In Camp with the Katchins"—a tribe of cattle-raiding mountaineers, living near the Chinese frontier of Upper Burma. This region is held of much strategic importance by England, as the detail of Colonel Colville, one of the best known officers for such service, attests. Colonel Colville made an interesting series of photographs during his travels from which Mr. A. F. Jaccaei has produced a most striking series of drawings.

—The anniversary services in connection with the Methodist church were held on Sunday and Monday last. On Sunday morning the Rev. Mr. McCamus, pastor of the church, delivered a sermon appropriate to the occasion and in the evening a service of song was also conducted by the pastor, which was very instructive and impressive. The large audience fully entered into the pathos and spirit of the various hymns sung so sweetly by the reverend gentleman during the sermon. On Monday evening the Rev. W. F. Wilson of Toronto, who appeared for the first time before a Millbrook audience, delivered his announced lecture on "Snags we Strike." This popular entertainer has all the appearances which command the attention and favor of his audience even before he commences to speak. Two Negroes Lynched.

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 20.—Bill Richardson and Jim Dickson, colored, were taken from the jail at Summerville early yesterday morning by a mob of one hundred men. The mob carried the prisoners off and neither have since been heard from. It is presumed they were lynched. The two men were accessories to the murder of Joseph Hall and the shooting of Town Marshall Murphy a few weeks ago.

Later.—It has been ascertained that Richardson and Dickson were hanged and their bodies riddled with bullets.
