W. A. PETHERICK & SONS WIN AWARDS AT WARKWORTH FAIR

W. A. Petherick & Sons, veteran exhibitors of Holsteins in Northumberland County, won the premier breeder and premier exhibitor awards at the county Black and White Day held September 29th in connection with Warkworth Fair. There were 103 head of Holsteins displayed by 18 exhibitors before judge James T. Brown, Newcastle.

The Grand Champion bull was shown by Douglas Turney, Morganston. He was the winning senior yearling Duncheesin Buster, who was made junior and then grand champion. This bull is a smooth, straight individual, with plenty of style and balance, an exceptionally good rump, and a good set of feet and legs. The senior champion was the winner in the aged bull class, Nelcrest Pilot, shown by Craig Nelson and Everett Lake, Campbellford. He was also named reserve grand champion. The reserve senior championship went to the second prize winner in the aged bull class, Almersin Lucky General, shown by W. A. Petherick & Son. N. Craig Nelson, Campbellford, brought out the reserve junior champion, taking this award on his first prize junior bull calf, Nelcrest Supreme Pilot.

The grand champion female was the first prize aged cow in milk, Almersin Sovereign Fern, shown by W. A. Petherick & Sons. She is a very sharp, clean-cut dairy cow, with size, balance, and a good udder. A very fine class was that for dry aged cows, which was headed by a lovely pair of white cows, almost identical in colour and
