

### Manvers Council Asks Auditors For Resignation

Bethany, Ont., Oct. 8, 1957.—The regular monthly meeting of Manvers Municipal Council was held on the above date with Reeve Argue in the chair; Deputy Reeve McGill and Councillors Brown, Jakeman and Malcolm in attendance.

The minutes of the August meeting were read and approved on motion of McGill and Brown. Carried.

The following communications were received and read: Bowmanville Hospital, re a possible indigent patient. Clerk of Bowmanville, re a relief matter. Township of North York, re a relief matter. Dept. of Radiology, Ross Memorial Hospital, re a delinquent account. Lake Ontario Development Association, re meeting on October 11th, 1957 in Cobourg. Dept. of Highways, re the annual audit of the road account. H.E.P.C., re 4 applications for Hydro service and an arrears account to be added to the tax roll. Magistrate Baxter, enclosing share of fines for the month of August. Fulton, Fulton & Staples, re a request to assist in a hospitalization matter; and list of the number of Jurors to be selected from the Clerk of the Peace.

On motion of Malcolm and Brown, By-Law No. 1339 was given the three necessary readings, signed, sealed and numbered. This By-Law deals with the assuming of all streets and lanes in registered Plans No. 33 and 46 as public thoroughfares and the Municipality to be responsible for maintenance of same.

A letter received from the firm of Humpage, Taylor and McDonald was reviewed; whereby the firm stated that Township Auditing fee would be increased for the 1957 auditing and that each school section would be increased. After considerable discussion the following motion was made:

Moved by Brown, seconded by Malcolm that the resignation of the present Municipal Auditors be requested. Carried.

Moved by McGill, seconded by Malcolm that a grant of \$15 be made to the Durham County 500 Bushel Club. Carried.

Moved by Malcolm, seconded by Jakeman, that the Municipality engage 3 Fence Viewers of the Township of Manvers to visit Mill Street in the Hamlet of Fleetwood and have all fences and obstructions that are encroaching on the said road allowance removed by whatever means are found to be necessary. Carried.

Moved by Jakeman, seconded by McGill that the Reeve and Treasurer be authorized to sign cheques for the following accounts: Treas. for transfer to rd. acc., road voucher No. 10 .....\$2550.81

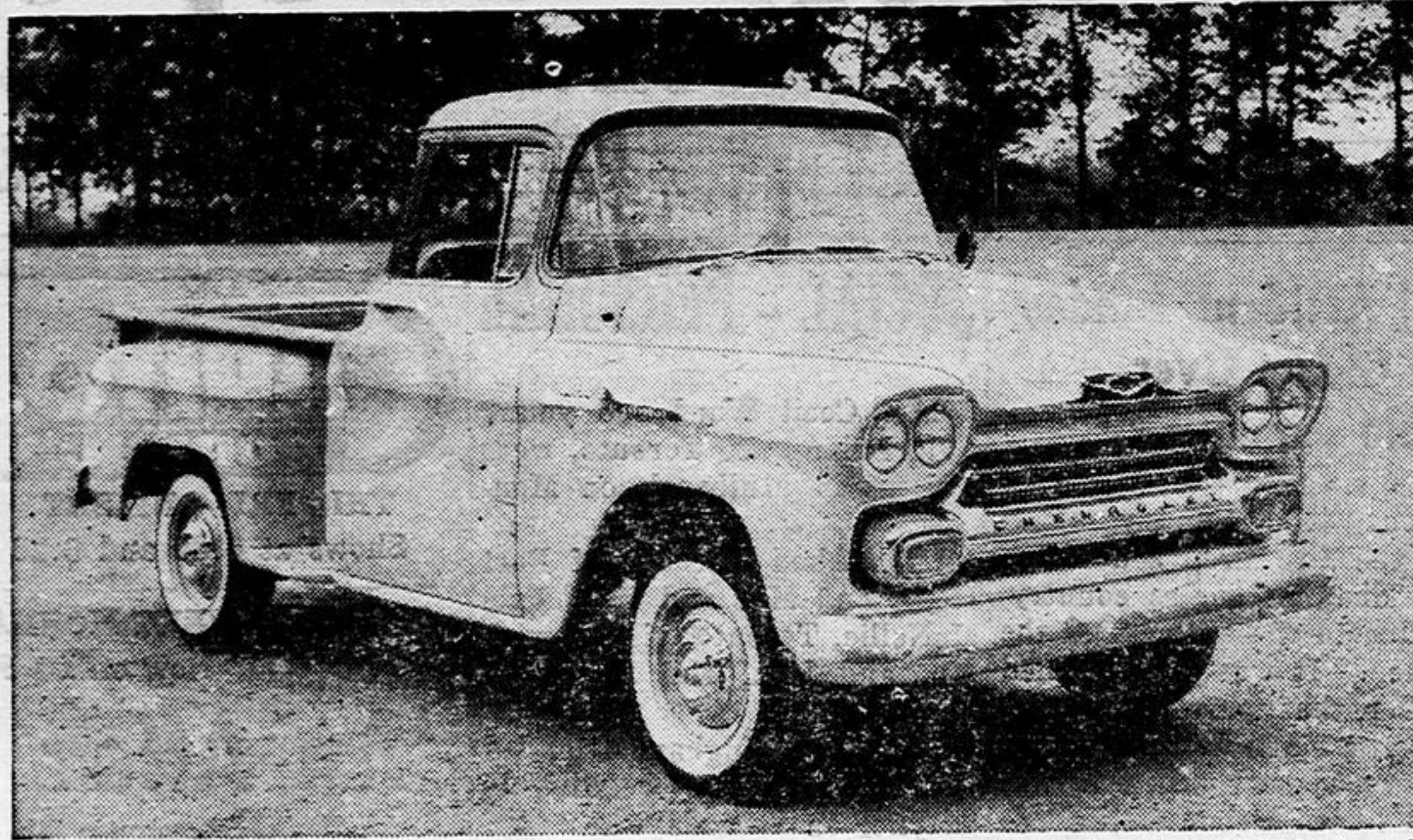

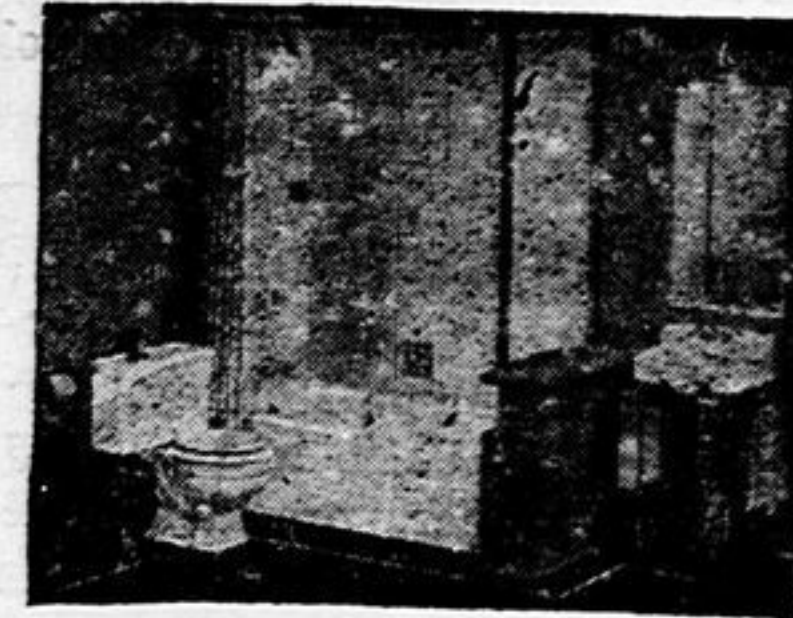
