E. Dent, Orono on School Issue

To The Editor, Millbrook Reporter: Millbrook, Ontario. Sir:

The School Issue

Out of the confusion of discussion on the school issue emerges one particular fact, that is the intense desire of communities to have secondary school facilities located in their midst. This fact means; that communities such as Newcastle, Orono, Millbrook, Hampton and others must feel there is some real advantage in having local secondary schools.

So it would be judicious if the school authorities would review their decisions, in this trend to fewer and larger schools.

We realize that this trend is based on some arguments of efficiency and economy. But does the smaller school need to be inefficient or uneconomical?

It is recognized by planning authorities that compact communities built around centres of shopping, churches, and schools can be the ideal of good planning for the future.

It lessons many problems of water, sewage, policing, fire, traffic, transportation, and crime, that are inherent in large heavily populated municipalities. Schools, then, should be of a size and location to further this principle of good planning.

In relating this to the school issue, the communities of this area are justified in seeking secondary school facilities. Newcastle, Orono, Millbrook had high schools. Two of these communities are still holding temporary accommodation. Newcastle has always regretted losing its High School. No one in these communities believed that the purpose of the High School Area was to remove their community schools and replace them with the "big school" plan. The large centres may have felt that the "big school" would mean material gain for their businesses. It has also brought

responsibilities which they, now, feel are burdensome.

The Area Board should recognize, and I believe they do, that bigness does not necessarily mean efficiency and, or, economy. As for the desire of the communities to keep or attain local schools, they have a right to be considered within reasonable limits of economy. The problem of efficiency must be resolved, providing there is an argument, that big schools are more efficient.

Educationally speaking; we could think of many arguments on both sides of that question. But even assuming that it is correct then the means should be found to improve the efficiency of the community sized school. Though I feel that we are measuring efficiency in terms of "mass-produced graduated robots". There is little chance, in a big school, for a specialist teacher, who only meets the student in one period a day, to nurture a student who may have the individuality of thought and action to achieve the greatness our complicated society so urgently needs.

We also need to realize that new concepts in education are being discussed. New methods of education are being considered. For example, the advent of teaching by closed circuit television is growing. It is being used to teach intricate methods of surgery in medical schools. It could be used to teach specialized subjects in our secondary schools. Education can be brought to the student in the small school and not the student transported to the education.

To sum up these thoughts. We should give these communities their schools. In Newcastle, Orono and Millbrook, the three, five, six or seven room schools could be built for practically the same cost as one fifteen twenty, or twenty-five room school. This is a democracy, and is the wish of these communities to have local secondary schools.
