Thomas S. Allin who was born in Toronto in 1875, where he was raised and educated, passed away at his home Lot 16, Con. 10, Hope Township, on Friday, October 3rd, 1958. Mr. Allin, in his 84th year, was in his usual fine health until a short time ago. He lived in the city where he was born until 1920 when he came to this neighbourhood to live, purchasing a farm across the Cavan-Hope Township dividing line, in Hope.
