We estimate about 10,000 Canadians, mostly children, are suffering from this most progressive and crippling disease of the muscles. Few of the child victims will live beyond adolescence. So far there is no known cure.

Our figure of 10,000 is merely an estimate because many parents aren't aware that their children have MD.

These people should know that an association exists in Canada whose function is to help them to find out if they have a victim of MD in the family, and to assist them in every way until a cure is found. This body of whom I am honorary chairman, is the Muscular Dystrophy Association of Cana. da. They are spending thousands each year on research to Saturday afternoon, Oct. 11th, find a cure.


