Editor Reporter:
Dear Sir:

I've chosen the Thanksgiving season to bring your attention to a matter for which so far we cannot give thanks; namely, the defeat of muscular dystrophy.

We estimate about 10,000 Canadians, mostly children, are suffering from this most progressive and crippling disease of the muscles. Few of the child victims will live beyond adolescence. So far there is no known cure.

Our figure of 10,000 is merely an estimate because many parents aren't aware that their children have MD.

These people should know that an association exists in Canada whose function is to help them to find out if they have a victim of MD in the family, and to assist them in every way until a cure is found. This body of whom I am honorary chairman, is the Muscular Dystrophy Association of Canada. They are spending thousands each year on research to find a cure.

By publishing this letter and encouraging your readers to let us know of cases in their families, their circle of friends, or their practices, you will be making a much needed contribution to the work already in progress aimed at defeating this disease.

DURHAM CO. FEDERATION OF AGRICULTURE COMMENCES FALL TERM

The first of the fall's monthly Directors Meeting of Durham County Federation of Agriculture was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Taylor, Enniskillen, with a small (but select) group of Directors in attendance. President Bruce Taylor chaired the meeting.

Following the adoption of the minutes a full agenda of accumulated business (since last June) was dealt with. It was reported that Durham County's entrant in the Dairy Queen Contest was successful in her first day's competition but was eliminated in the semi-finals—Mrs. Gordon Wilson of Garden Hill district.

Much discussion, re the Ed. Summers Memorial Fund culminated in motions appointing Bruce Taylor and Agricultural Representative O. Dalrymple to see about getting a suitable mount for Mr. Summers' wrist watch to be used later for a trophy. It was decided that \$5.00 would be voted annually for a miniature trophy to accompany the large Ed Summers Memorial Trophy, to become the property of high boy at the Royal Winter Fair Judging Contest.

Messrs Garnet Rickard and Secretary Clarence Allin were appointed to represent the Federation of Agriculture on the Board of Trustees to be set up to guide the destiny of the Summers Memorial Fund through forthcoming years.

The Annual meeting of Ontario Federation of Agriculture will be held early in November at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto.

It was decided to dispense with the services of a full time Fieldman this year. Appreciation was expressed of the services of past fieldman, Jack Arnott, during the last three fall and winter seasons.

The President, Ron Brooks and Bev Gray were named a committee to promote the Prince and Princess Competition in Durham County. Particulars can be secured from these gentlemen. Director's mileage rate, secretary and

treasurer's salaries were set by motion. It was decided that Township employees collecting annual levy for the Federation will be paid on a 4% basis for this extra work in future.

Bruce Taylor reported on member meetings he had attended this summer. The Royal Commission on Price Spreads was discussed.

The request of a Durham resident for information re water rights (surface) had been looked into and was to be forwarded

to interested party immediately. Due to the lateness of the hour business re forthcoming Annual Meeting will be dealt with at a future executive meeting. Mrs. Taylor served a splendid lunch and Don Staples thanked the Taylors for their hospitality. Meeting adjourned.
