Every available officer had already been hurried out to work on the case, and Sergt. McDonald, who had just come in from other work, was preparing to follow. The door was pushed gently open and in walked a small, smooth-shaven man, poorly dressed, and carrying a revolver in his hand. He shook like a man with the palsy, his face was white and drawn. great drops af per-spiration chased each other down his face, and his tottering limbs seemed scarcely able to hold him upright. He walked up to Mc-Donald, who is a powerful fellow, six feet tall, and, looking him straight in the eyes, said :-

"I aid it." "You did it?" asked McDonald. "Yes, I did it."

"Did what?" said the officer, as he laid one hand on the fellow's arm and quietly took the revolver.

"I shot Mayor Harrison, and that's what I shot him with," was the reply, as Prendergast made a motion with his hand toward the revolver.
