LUCKEY WILL BE HANGED.

He is Found Guilty, and Will Die December 14th.

BROCKVILLE, Nov. 8.—Charles Luckey was to-day found guilty of the murder of his father, stepmother and sister and sentenced to be hanged on Dec. 14.

This morning the Crown started the evidence in rebuttal and adduced some very damaging statements against the prisoner. It was of a nature to break up the story told by Luckey of securing the boots on the train and accounting for the money on his person.

Hannah, who was with Luckey on the train, did not see him with the boots. The turnkey of the Ottawa jail stated most emphatically that Luckey did not have money in his socks, as he was stripped and the socks turned inside out and all other articles of clothing examined.

The defence evidence of a stranger with red stockings being in the vicinity of the Luckey place at the time of the fire was also pretty well broken up by witnesses who traced this man all the way from Newbliss to Brockville.

It was just 10:40 when Mr. Lavelle started to address the jury. He has an impressive manner and worked the old theory of accidental fire and the suffocation of the victims.

The address of Mr. Lavelle for the defence lasted four hours and twenty minutes and was masterly.

The prosecuting attorney, Mr. Clute, occupied just 45 minutes, and his presentation of the damaging facts contained in the evidence presented by the Crown was one of the ablest ever listened to in the court here. The jury were evidently deeply impressed by the address, and the prisoner for the first time showed visible signs of anxiety in his countenance, as point after point was scored against him.

At 4:45 Judge Rose began his charge, which was strongly against the prisoner in every particular.

At 5:30 the jury retired and returned in a little over an hour with a verdict of guilty. The judge addressed a few words of counsel to the prisoner and condemned him to be hanged on Dec. 14. The condemned man took his sentence very coolly and walked out of the court room in company with Jailer McDougall with as firm a step as any man in the room.

HOOPER COMMITTED.

Proceedings in the Preliminary Examination at Joliette Conclude—The Indictment for Murder.

At the conclusion of the evidence in the Hooper case the following indictment was read.

"John R. Hooper of the City of Ottawa, Province of Ontario, printer, stands charged before the undersigned, one of the Majesty's Justices of the Peace, duly appointed according to the provision of the act of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, 33 Victoria, chapter xii, having jurisdiction in and for the District of Joliette, aforesaid, this fourth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand, eight hundred and ninety-three, for that he, the said John R. Hooper, on or about the eighteenth day of the month of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand, eight hundred and ninety-three did on a certain railway train then travelling through the District of Joliette, at some point in the said district between Lanoraie and Terrebonne, knowingly, wilfully and feloniously administer to, or cause to be taken, then travelling with the said John R. Hooper on board the said railway train, a certain deadly poison, to wit, prussic acid or other deadly poisonous substances, with intent, and in so doing, and thereby unlawfully and wilfully and of his malice aforethought, to kill and murder the said Georgina Leblanc, his wife, aforesaid, who expired at the station at Terrebonne, in the said district of Joliette, and the said charge being read to the said John R. Hooper and the witnesses for the prosecution, Rosalie St. Andre, Elzear Lamual, Teuissant Malo, Edmond Leblanc, Raymond Beaudoin, Joseph Arthur Letourneau, Alphonse Duguay, Messire D. Laporte, Hilaire Neveu, Joseph Fitzpatrick, Cynille Rivest Francois Larivieres, Gilbert Bruneau, Joseph Lavigne, Bastille Lauriers, Joseph Alfred Duchesneau, Joseph Peausoleil, Wilfrid Contant, Joseph Emile Grenier, Robert W. Webb, Robert A. Corbett, Wm. J. Douglas, Charles E. Clarke, Mrs. Francis Emily Cooper, Ernest Pierre Robitaille, Rhipil Dion, Cleophas Bolduc, Philip Bellefeuille, Philip Dusablon and Alice Stapley, being severally examined in his presence, the said John R. Hooper is now addressed by me as follows:—

"Having heard the evidence, do you wish to say anything in answer to the charge? You are not obliged to say anything unless you desire to do so, but whatever you say will be taken down in writing and may be given as evidence against you at your trial. You must clearly understand that you have nothing to hope from any promise of favor, and nothing to fear from any threat which may have been held out to induce you to make a confession of guilt, but whatever you may say will be given in evidence against you upon your trial, notwithstanding such promise or threat.

"Received before me at Joliette, the day, month and year first above mentioned. Chas. B. H. Leprohon, Justice of the Peace."

COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

It was a trying moment for the accused, but he stood it well. As the reading progressed he grew visibly pale, but this was the only evidence shown of the terrific strain under which he must have labored. At the conclusion of the reading, Magistrate Leprohon asked the prisoner if he had anything to say.

"Je suis non coupable, monsieur," replied Hooper, holding his hand impressively aloft at the same time.

Fixing his eyes upon the prisoner, the Magistrate made the following statement:—"I do not say there is a proof of guilt, but the law tells the Magistrate he must commit if there is the slightest evidence of it. I therefore commit you to goal, where you shall remain until the 15th of December, to await your trial before the Court of Queen's Bench."

This decision created no surprise, it being a foregone conclusion that it would be rendered to that effect.

Hooper appeared as cheerful as ever after the decision had been rendered, and thanked the magistrate. When asked by your correspondent if he had anything to say he replied that he had not, excepting that he was grateful for the fair manner with which the majority of the newspapers had reported the evidence submitted.

It is thought that the trial will not take place until after the 1st of next January.

Joliette will have a spell of comparative quiet for a while now. Messrs. Greenshields and Ward left on the early morning train, and Miss Stapley and the press representatives left Saturday evening.
