E. A. SUMMERS PASSES IN BOWMANVILLE

Durham County's agricultural representative for 27 years, Edward Alvin Summers, age 63, died suddenly on Saturday, November 2nd, in Bowmanville Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Summers was born in Winchester on October 4, 1894, son of Charles A. Summers and Mary Ann Holmes. His wife, the former Ena D. Weegar, survives.

The popular agricultural representative was active in many associations connected with farm activities, and his work was distinguished by many victories of 4-H Clubs and Junior Farmers.

His feed judging teams captured 26 consecutive first prizes at the Central Ontario Spring Show, held in Peterborough in March. This was formerly the Quinte Annual Seed Fair.

Mr. Summers was well known throughout Durham County, and was a favourite at banquets as his ready wit when making an address was always much appreciated by his listeners.
