

### Petition Asks For Vote On Liquor Outlet In Village

A regular meeting of the Municipal Council of this Village of Millbrook was held on this date with all members present, Reeve G. F. Harrington presiding.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read by the Clerk and on motion of Councillors Coulter and Raymes were approved.

The following communications were read:

From Clerk of the United Counties re, hospitalization of indigent patient, Peterborough Civic Hospital. Community Planning Association re, Annual Conference to be held in Bondon, November 8th, 1957. Department of Highways, interim subsidy. Cheque enclosed in the amount of \$1,359.09. Northumberland and Durham Health Unit, reporting for the month of September. Department of Municipal Affairs, cheque enclosed in the amount of \$1,210.50 for the second and final instalment of the Municipal Unconditional Grant for this year, payable to this Municipality.

Motion by Councillors Coulter and North that communications be received and filed.

Mr. C. Warden and Mr. J. McMillen representing the Consumers Gas Co. of Toronto were present to interview the Council re, the possibility of supplying the Village with natural gas for heating, lighting etc.

No action was taken by the Council at this meeting.

The Clerk reported the following:

1. Re: The petition for a vote for a liquor outlet in the Village. After ruling out 26 names that for different reasons it is believed did not count, the petition contained 28 more names than the required number. This was certified and the petition was forwarded to the Liquor Licence Board of Ontario.

The date set for the election is Wednesday, January 15th, 1958.

2. Re: The petition for a water main on Anne Street. As two signers of the petition have requested in writing to have their names removed and the Local Improvement Act is not very definite on this point, more time is needed.

Here are some handy tips on storing your tractor for the winter . . .

they will save you time and money next spring!

First, either drain the radiator and block completely, or fill with the correct amount of anti-freeze. If storing for very long periods, also drain the entire fuel system, fuel tank, settling cup, fuel lines, screens and carburetor. Remember, fuel left in the tractor for a long period of time may form harmful gum deposits.



Now, lubricate the tractor thoroughly to remove any old grease which may contain moisture, acids or other impurities. Wash and clean the dirt off the outside of the tractor . . . and paint over any bare spots to prevent rust. Make sure the battery is fully charged and stored in a warm, dry place. Check frequently and recharge about once every thirty days.



Next, remove the spark plugs and squirt light engine oil into each cylinder. Oil the valves and valve mechanism, then turn the engine over a few times to distribute the oil. This prevents rust and corrosion internally.



Last but not least, don't let your tractor stand in the open or be a roosting place for the chickens. If you can't put it in a machine shed, then cover the tractor with a tarpaulin.
