"A Good Suggestion"

The following article appeared in our October 23rd edition: "A subscriber of The Reporter has made the suggestion that due to the wide spread of RABIES among foxes that the township councils make a worthwhile bonus for all of these animals destroyed. This sounds like a good suggestion to us, what is your opinion?"

An answer was received to this but due to no Reporter on Nov. 6th, and the lack of space on Nov. 13th, the letter was held over until this week. Here it is—

Dear Sir:

Since you have made the obvious mistake of asking for opinions re Twsp. Councils paying bonus on foxes, we shall proceed to make just as apparent a mistake by offering one.

We think it would be a capital idea if it weren't for the following reasons:
(1) Since it is the Dept. of Lands and Forest who have due to past actions (or lack of same) allowed the fox population to increase beyond reason despite the fact they were fully aware of the prevalence of rabies in Northern Areas, the onus lies on that Dept. not the Municipal Councils to do something drastic to curtail it and pay compensation for losses sustained.
(2) Were any twsp. council to start paying a bonus for foxes, unless all other neighbouring councils did likewise, they would find that an amazing number of foxes would suddenly come within their boundaries to be dispatched to the Happy Hunting Grounds.

Next question as to disposal of carrion—a plot in the local cemetery or what. What on superficial examination might appear to be "a good suggestion" on closer scrutiny would seem to be "not so hot". Let the responsibility lay on the Depts. whose obligation it is to oversee wildlife activities and not saddle "the poor little old ratepayer" with any additional extra expense—we have yet to hear one ratepayer claim his taxes were too low no matter how hard we try to make his tax money go further.

However we compliment you for a good try and as the old adage states, if at first you don't succeed try, try, try, again. Mebbe better luck next time.
