

Federation Is Told Farmers Need Single Voice For Results

"In these days of collective bargaining, only the indifference of farmers can defeat our farm marketing legislation."

Louis Davis, 1st vice-president of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture told some 250 farmers, their wives and guests at the Annual Meeting of the Durham County Federation of Agriculture held in Blackstock Saturday evening, Nov. 30th.

Co-operation Among Farmers

In urging all farmers to work together Mr. Davis emphasized the importance of co-operation

among them. The Government has clearly indicated there must be one overall farm voice, he said.

"Therefore the Federation has adopted an open door policy to allow way for 100 per cent co-operation from the Farmer's Union", he concluded. Bob Jardine, sec'y-manager of the Ontario Cream Producers introduced the speaker. Richard Bowles thanked Mr. Davis.
