Omemece, Dec. 15th, 1905. Council met at Ten o'clock a.m., pursuant to statute and as per adjournment. Present all the members, that is to say: James R. Boate, Reeve, and Councillors James Courtney, William Cottingham, Isaac H. Fee and William Herlihey. The Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of last session were read, approved and on motion confirmed.

The following communications were received, perused and filed, that is to say: From the Sec. of the Home for the Aged at Lindsay, enclosing an account amounting to \$31.80 for maintenance of Peter Waters and Julia Sullivan.

From James White, Geographer, Department of the Interior, Ottawa, acknowledging receipt of corrected map of this Township.

From Municipal World re separate school and levy of general rate thereon. From Thomas Stewart, Esq., Barrister, in the levy of general free school rate on separate school supporters.

From the Clerk of the township of Cavan enclosing boundary act 1905.

From secretary of the Board of Railway Commissioners at Ottawa, acknowledging receipt of resolution passed at last session, in re the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific Railway crossings in Lindsay.
